

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



MID-EASTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) enters its 53rd year of intercollegiate competition with the 2023–24 academic school year. Located in Norfolk, Va., the MEAC is made up of eight outstanding historically black institutions across the Atlantic coastline: Coppin State University, Delaware State University, Howard University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Morgan State University, Norfolk State University, North Carolina Central University and South Carolina State University.

The MEAC sponsors 14 Division I (FCS) sports: women's bowling, men's and women's basketball,

men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's track & field, softball and volleyball. The MEAC receives automatic NCAA qualification bids in seven sports – men's and women's basketball, women's bowling, men's and women's tennis, softball and volleyball. The MEAC's football champion is pitted against the champion of the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) in the Cricket Celebration Bowl, which debuted in December 2015.

In 1969, a bold ad hoc group of innovators long associated with intercollegiate athletics met in Durham, N.C. to discuss the feasibility of organizing a new conference. From these discussions, they

formed a steering and planning committee to fully investigate the idea, presented a detailed report with recommendations to interested collegiate institutions, and constructed a workshop to outline proposals.

The conference was confirmed in 1970, kicking off its first season of competition in football in 1971.

On June 8, 1980, the MEAC was classified as a Division I conference by the NCAA; prior to that year, the conference had operated on the Division II level. The month after achieving Division I status, the MEAC received automatic qualification to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship. Currently, the conference has automatic qualifying bids for NCAA

postseason play in men's basketball (since 1981), women's basketball (since 1982), softball (since 1995), men's and women's tennis (since 1998), volleyball (since 1994) and women's bowling (since 2018).

In 2015, the MEAC combined with the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) for the Celebration Bowl in Atlanta, Ga. North Carolina A&T State defeated Alcorn State in the inaugural Celebration Bowl to determine the Black College National Champion in a game pitting the MEAC and SWAC champions. North Carolina Central represented the MEAC in the 2016 Celebration Bowl, taking on Grambling State.

North Carolina A&T State returned to the Celebration Bowl in 2017, defeating Grambling State 21-14 to complete the first undefeated season in MEAC history and claim the Aggies' second Black College National Championship in three years. In 2022, North Carolina Central defeated heavy favorite Jackson State 41-34 in overtime to claim the program's first-ever Celebration Bowl title and give the MEAC a 6-1 record in the bowl game.

The MEAC also has a strong presence in the National Football League (NFL), both throughout the league's history and today. For the start of the 2022 season, there were 12 former MEAC players on active NFL rosters — highlighted by South Carolina State's Darius Leonard (2018 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, two-time Pro Bowler) and Decobie Durant (2022 fourth-round draft pick).

SOUTHWESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE HISTORY

About the SWAC: The Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) is considered one of the premier HBCU conferences in the country and currently ranks among the elite in the nation in terms of HBCU alumni playing with professional sports teams.

Current championship competition offered by the league includes competition for men in Baseball, Basketball, Cross Country, Football, Golf, Indoor Track and Field and Tennis.

Women's competition is offered in the sports of Basketball, Bowling, Cross Country, Golf, Indoor Track and Field, Outdoor Track and Field, Soccer, Softball, Tennis and Volleyball.

SWAC Quick Facts: The Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) is a collegiate athletic conference headquartered in Birmingham, Alabama, which is made up of historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) in the Southern United States. It participates in the NCAA's Division I for all sports; in football, it participates in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS), formerly referred to as Division I-AA.

On the gridiron, the conference has been the biggest draw on the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) level of the NCAA, leading the nation in average home attendance for 44 of the 45 seasons. In 1994, the SWAC fell just 40,000 fans short of becoming the first non-Football Bowl Subdivision conference to attract one million fans to its home games.

The History of the SWAC: In 1920, athletic officials from six Texas HBCUs — C.H. Fuller of Bishop College, Red Randolph and C.H. Patterson of Paul Quinn College, E.G. Evans, H.J. Evans and H.J. Starns of Prairie View A&M, D.C. Fuller of Texas College and G. Whitte Jordan of Wiley College — met in Houston, Texas, to discuss common interests. At this meeting, they agreed to form a new league, the SWAC.

Paul Quinn became the first of the original members to withdraw from the league when it did so in 1929. When Langston University of Oklahoma was admitted into the conference two years later, it began the migration of state-supported institutions into the SWAC. Southern University entered the ranks in 1934, followed by Arkansas AM&N (now the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff) in 1936 and Texas Southern University in 1954.

Rapid growth in enrollment of the state-supported schools made it difficult for the church-supported schools to finance their athletics programs, and one by one they fell victim to the growing prowess of the state-supported colleges. Bishop withdrew from the conference in 1956, Langston in 1957 and Huston-Tillotson (formerly Samuel Huston) in 1959, one year after the admittance of two more state-supported schools: Grambling College and Jackson State College.

The enter-exit cycle continued in 1961 when Texas College withdrew, followed by the admittance of Alcorn A&M (now Alcorn State University) in 1962. Wiley left in 1968, the same year Mississippi Valley State College entered. Arkansas AM&N exited in 1970 and Alabama State University entered in 1982.

Arkansas-Pine Bluff (formerly Arkansas AM&N) rejoined the SWAC on July 1, 1997, regaining full-member status one year later. Alabama A&M University became the conference's tenth member when it became a full member in September 1999, after a one year period as an affiliate SWAC member. Most of the former SWAC members that have left the conference are currently a part of the Red River Athletic Conference of the NAIA. Howard University became a charter member in women's soccer prior to the 2014 season.

In 2021, SWAC membership expanded to 12 institutions with the additions of Florida A&M University (Tallahassee, Fla.) and Bethune-Cookman University (Davtona Beach, Fla.).

Our Vision for the Future of the SWAC:

- Create collaborative process in which the "new vision" for the SWAC is a shared vision that is all inclusive.
- 2. Increase corporate partnerships.
- 3. Create Regional Television Network.
- 4. Engage with past SWAC "greats" to assist with branding of conference.
- **5.** Strengthen officiating in all sports, with emphasis on revenue generating and high profile sports.
- Improve championships for student-athletes and fans, so they can receive a "First Class Experience" (locations, gifts, entertainment).
- Establish and maintain excellent relationships with city, state, and corporate partners.

Legendary Former SWAC Athletes: The Southwestern Athletic Conference for decades has produced some of the most legendary athletes to play major professional sports.

Eddie Robinson, Walter Payton, Jerry Rice, Doug Williams, Deacon Jones, Robert Brazille, Steve McNair, Aeneas Williams, and Michael Strahan are just a few of the legendary names of the game that attended SWAC member institutions, and the list doesn't stoo there.

On the hardwood, the SWAC helped foster the talents of Naithsmith Hall of Fame member Willis Reed (Grambling State), Avery Johnson (Southern), Bobby Phills (Southern), Zelmo Beaty (Prairie View A&M), Lindsey Hunter (Jackson State) and Jegendary coaches Ben Jobe and Dave Whitney.

TIFFANY GREENE
PLAY-BY-PLAY

Tiffany Greene is a play-by-play commentator for ESPN, covering a variety of collegiate sports including basketball, football, softball and volleyball. She is the first African-American woman to serve as a play-by-play commentator for college football on ESPN.

Greene has called a number of postseason games including the NCAA Women's Division I Basketball Tournament, NCAA Softball Regional and Super Regionals, as well as NCAA Volleyball Regionals.

Greene originally began working with ESPN as a college football sideline reporter in 2012. She has since worked on the Women's College World Series, Air Force Reserve Bowl on ABC and multiple bowl games.

Prior to ESPN, Greene honed her skills as a playby-play announcer and sports reporter at Bright House Sports Network in the Orlando and Tampa Bay markets. During that time, she was the playby-play announcer for the inaugural season of BIG EAST women's basketball on Fox Sports 1. Greene is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Links Incorporated and the National Association of Black Journalists. She began her on-air career in 2004 as a one-man band reporter at WJCL/WTGS, and later, WTOC in Savannah, Georgia.

Greene earned her Bachelor's degree in Broadcast Journalism from the Florida A&M University. She serves as the FAMU School of Journalism & Graphic Communication Board of Visitors co-chair.



JAY WALKER

Jay Walker joined ESPN in 2005 as a college football analyst. He has called the ESPNU Thursday Night games for the last four years, in addition to a studio analyst for the last two years. He has also been an analyst on College Football Overdrive.

Walker started his television career with BET and then joined the now defunct MBC Network from 2002-05.

Out of college, Walker was drafted in the seventh round in 1994 by the New England Patriots, where he played for two seasons. He also spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings. Walker was drafted out of high school to be a pitcher in the California Angels organization's minor league team, one of a handful of players to play both minor league baseball and in the NFL. While playing in the minors, Walker decided to pursue his passion for football and was recruited as a quarterback to Long Beach State and eventually transferred to Howard University after football was cut as a sport at Long Beach. At Howard, Walker led the team to their first playoff berth in team history and was named an All-American, to the All-MEAC Team twice and was the I-AA football player of the year by Sports Illustrated. That year, 1993, Howard earned its only undefeated season in program history.

A native of Los Angeles, Walker is a 1994 graduate from Howard with a political science degree. In 2005, he was inducted into the Howard University Athletics Hall of Fame, and most recently, he was named to the MEAC/SWAC All-Time Greatest Team.

Currently, Walker is CEO and President of Walker Financial Services and has been a member of the House of Delegates in Maryland since 1997. He serves on the House Ways and Means Committee and its education and finance resources subcommittees. He is also a member of the Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland.



QUINT KESSENICH

Quint Kessenich began at ESPN in 1993 covering men's lacrosse. He currently serves as a lacrosse analyst and college sports reporter, working on football and wrestling.

Kessenich works on television's most extensive college lacrosse package – featuring regular-season action and the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship, an event he has covered since 1995. He also works as an analyst on Major League Lacrosse games on ESPN2 and ESPN3.

Under his reporting duties, Kessenich covers college football and the NCAA Division I Wrestling Championship.

Since joining the company, his responsibilities

expanded to high school football, men's college basketball and various NCAA championships, including track and field, and soccer. He established the ESPNU Lacrosse Podcast in 2010, and it quickly became the industry leader for lacrosse news. He was also a frequent contributor to ESPNU.com. In addition, he has covered the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes for ESPN and ABC.

Kessenich contributes to Inside Lacrosse Magazine, and is actively involved with "First Stick", a non-profit that introduces urban schools and athletes to the game of lacrosse. He was also a columnist on college lacrosse for the Baltimore Sun.

Kessenich played one year of professional lacrosse with the Baltimore Thunder in 1999, and at the amateur level for the storied Mount Washington Lacrosse Club.

A four-time all-American goalkeeper, Kessenich was a two-time winner of the Ensign C. Markland Kelly, Jr., Award as the nation's best goalie. A 1990 graduate of Johns Hopkins University, Kessenich remained in Baltimore where he has been an assistant lacrosse coach at the Boys' Latin School, a perennial national power since 1992.

He is a member of the Johns Hopkins Athletic Hall of Fame, as well as the Long Island Chapter and the Baltimore Chapter of USA Lacrosse Hall of Fame.



HARRY LYLES, JR. REPORTER

Harry Lyles Jr. joined ESPN in March of 2020, serving as both a staff writer for ESPN.com, a host/commentator across ESPN studio and digital programming, and a sideline reporter for ESPN college sports. For ESPN.com, Lyles Jr. reports on college football and the intersection of culture and college sports.

Lyles Jr. is the longtime co-host of Countdown

to GameDay on all ESPN digital platforms. The show, airing Saturdays throughout the fall and winter, serves as the pregame coverage to College GameDay Built by The Home Depot. He is a mainstay on all ESPN digital programming across the ESPN App, YouTube, Facebook, Twitter and more. Additionally, he is the sideline reporter for ESPN Thursday Night Football with play-by-play

commentator Matt Barrie and analyst Dan Mullen. Lyles Jr. appears regularly on Around The Horn, SportsCenter and more.

Prior to his time at ESPN, Lyles Jr. spent four years at SB Nation as a reporter and columnist, with additional stops at various outlets, including The Comeback. A proud Georgia State alum, he resides in his hometown of Atlanta, Ga.

THE REMATCH WE'VE BEEN WAITING FOR

Two familiar teams will clash for bragging rights among historically black colleges and universities at the Cricket MEAC/SWAC Challenge Kickoff, as South Carolina State from the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference and the defending Southwestern Athletic Conference champion Jackson State face off at Center Parc Stadium in Atlanta, Ga.

This should be an interesting contest. The last time the Bulldogs and the Tigers faced each other was in the 2021 Celebration Bowl. South Carolina State topped Jackson State, 31-10, to capture the black college national championship.

South Carolina State was picked third in the preseason MEAC standings. Bulldogs head coach Buddy Pough is one of the best coaches in FCS (Football Championship Subdivision) football. Pough has put together a great defense led by senior defensive lineman Patrick Godbolt and junior linebacker Aaron Smith.

Godbolt is a terrific all-around defensive player and a great run stopper. Godbolt had 45 total and 33 solo tackles.

He is also one of the MEAC's best pass rushers. The 6-3, 235-pounder, used his sharp footwork, strength and quickness to get to the quarterback, finishing with 4.5 sacks last season.

Smith brings outstanding playmaking skills to the Bulldogs' defense. He can tackle in the open field and

total and 46 solo tackles with five sacks last season.

T.C. Taylor will be making his debut as Jackson State's head coach. Taylor replaces Deion Sanders who is now the head coach at the University of Colorado. Taylor coached the tight ends and wide receivers for the last three years under Coach Sanders.

Coach Taylor will lead a far different team than the one he worked with for the last three years. Those Tigers led the nation in defense. Coach

Taylor is hoping he can continue to put forth a top defensive unit in 2023. He plans to play physical and discipline defense.

Devonta Davis, a 6-3, junior will lead this year's defense. Davis finished 2022 with 2.5 sacks and 4.0 tackles for loss.

The Tigers have been picked to finish second in the SWAC East. Taylor has a major player on offense with tight end D.J. Stevens who received first-team All-SWAC preseason recognition.

Stevens, a 6-4, 235-pound senior, can make the big catch in the middle of the field. He played a significant role in the Tigers' high-scoring offense

last season. He had 37 catches for 376 yards and four touchdowns. He averaged 28.9 yards a reception.

A year ago, Alabama State edged Howard University, 23-13 giving the SWAC only its fifth win in the MEAC/SWAC Challenge. South Carolina State and Jackson State are household names in black college football. Both schools have a lot of experience playing on the big stage and it doesn't get any bigger than ABC at 7:30 p.m. For an early season game between these two Division I (FCS) HBCU conferences, it doesn't get any better than this one. The winner usually carries some momentum into the regular season.

COL (Ret.) Alexander Conyers is the 13th president of South Carolina State University. Prior to this role, he served the university as interim president, acting president and vice president for strategic alliances and initiatives.

President Conyers is an experienced servant leader having served over 28 years in the U.S. Army. He is a proven leader who has led complex organizations in areas of leadership, recruitment, retention, training, human resources, finance and budget, safety, and accreditation. His assignments consisted of many stateside locations including two tours at the Pentagon and South Korea, Canada, Afghanistan, and Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

President Conyers previously served in Washington, D.C., in the Senior Executive Service (federal government just below presidential appointees) as the deputy assistant secretary of the Army (Review Boards), a two-star general equivalent. In this capacity, he led the Army Review Boards Agency, which on behalf of the secretary of the Army serves as the highest administrative level for review and appeal of personnel actions taken by lower levels of the Army. The agency administers 12 different boards and adjudicates over 20,000 cases annually from soldiers, veterans, and family members. He was responsible for boards that adjudicate cases involving evaluation and promotions, discharge upgrades, physical disability, eliminations, the parole board for military prisoners, and other cases.

He completed his military career in 2016 after rising from private to colonel as the leader of the Army's largest and most complex

military police brigade. He led over 3,600 soldiers and civilians across four military installations: Ft. Bragg, North Carolina, Ft. Stewart, Georgia, Ft. Campbell, Kentucky, and Ft. Drum, New York. He was also responsible for the safety of the Ft. Bragg community with a population of over 100,000 personnel.

President Conyers remained intimately involved with SC State while serving in the Army. He served as a member of the SCSU Board of Visitors, chairman of the Student Relations Committee for the SCSU National Alumni Association, and a member of the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee. He was featured as a 2016 honoree on the Stellar Alumni Calendar. He has also been inducted into SC State ROTC Hall of Fame and most recently served as the president of the Washington, D.C., Chapter of the National Alumni Association.

A Manning, South Carolina, native, President Conyers holds a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from SC State, a master's degree in corrections from the University of South Carolina, and a master's degree in public administration from Troy University. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and The University of North Carolina's Leadership, Excellence and Development (LEAD) program. He is a member of several professional associations, including the American Association of Blacks in Higher Education, and a former adjunct professor at Upper lowa University.

He is married to First Lady Agatha Conyers, and they have two children. Ace and Alv.

South Carolina State Hall of famer Keisha Campbell is entering her second year as acting director of athletics at her alma mater.

Campbell, the second female athletics director to lead the SC State Program, brings a wealth of experience in athletics administration to the university, a member of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC).

She returns to Orangeburg after serving several years in education in the public sector in South Carolina. She previously served as a senior associate commissioner at the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA).

Prior to her stint at the CIAA, she was director of business affairs and lead coordinator at the University of Texas at Dallas and was promoted from assistant to associate director of championships at the NCAA (2006-2009).

Campbell is no stranger to the MEAC, as she formerly was employed at former MEAC member Hampton University,

where she served as an assistant director of athletics, then was promoted to associate director of athletics for the Pirates (2004-2006). She returned to Hampton in 2011 as the director of athletics.

An SCSU Athletics Hall of Famer, the Blenheim, S.C., native was named Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Player of the Year while playing for the Lady Bulldogs and is a member of the MEAC 50th Anniversary All-Time Team. She also served seven years as head women's basketball coach at SC State and was named MEAC Coach of the Year in 2001.

Campbell earned both a bachelor's degree in physical education and a master's in rehabilitation counseling at SC State.

Campbell, valedictorian at Blenheim (Marlboro County, S.C.) High School in 1987, is a 2008 graduate of the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletics Administrators (NACWAA) HERS Institute and a 2006 graduate of the NCAA's Inaugural Leadership Institute for Ethnic Minority Females.

OLIVER "BUDDY" POUGH wrapped up his 21st season as head football coach at South Carolina State, his alma mater, and is the all-time winningest coach in school history.

During his 21-year tenure at the school where he earned a bachelor's and a master's, as well as All-MEAC honors as an offensive lineman. Pough has compiled an overall record of 146-87 and a 112-42 MEAC worksheet.

His teams captured three MEAC titles (2008, 2009 and 2021) outright, shared four others (2004, 2010, 2013, 2014 and 2019), and made four trips to the prestigious FCS playoffs (2008, 2009, 2010 and 2013).

Pough captured his first Celebration Bowl Championship in 2021 knocking off top-ranked Jackson State to win his fifth (5th) HBCU National Crown.

SC State had its best turnaround in 2013 with a 9-4 overall. 7-1 MEAC record after suffering their first losing season under Pough at 5-6 overall and 4-4 in the MEAC in 2012. In 2011, the Bulldogs compiled a 7-4 overall worksheet and were 6-2 in the MEAC. During the 2010 season, Pough's team finished 9-3 and was 7-1 in the MEAC to tie for the championship after winning the title outright in both 2009 and 2008. His squad also earned its third straight berth to the FCS playoffs and finished the 2010 campaign ranked high in all the HBCU and Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) polls.

In 2009, SC State was named National Black Champion by the Sheridan Broadcasting Network, the 100 Percent Wrong Club of Atlanta, the Washington (DC) Pigskin Club and the Box-to-Row/BASN. In addition, the Bulldogs finished number seven in all three major FCS polls - The Sports Network, the FCS Coaches Poll and Any Given Saturday.

Pough's 2009 squad finished 10-3 overall, captured its second consecutive MEAC crown with an unblemished 8-0 record and made back-to-back appearances in the FCS playoffs. The Orangeburg native reaped Coach of the Year honors in the MEAC - his second in as many seasons - and also earned the accolade from the (Columbia, S.C.) State newspaper, the Washington Pigskin Club, the 100 Percent Wrong Club of Atlanta and the Orangeburg Touchdown Club.

His 2008 squad was just as impressive, finishing 10-2 and winning the MEAC title with an 8-0 mark, the team's first outright title in 14 seasons, and returning to the FCS playoffs for the first time since the 1982 campaign.

Pough became the 14th head football coach at South Carolina State, while posting a 7-5 overall record and a 4-4 mark in the MEAC in his inaugural season in 2002. In 2003, he guided the Bulldogs to an 8-4 overall record and a 6-2 mark in MEAC play, losing only to Hampton and Bethune- Cookman.

The 2004 season can be considered another one of the team's best under Pough, as the Bulldogs produced the first-of-two consecutive 9-2 seasons. SC State was 6-2 in MEAC play that season, tving the Hampton Pirates for the 2004 championship.

In 2005, Pough's team duplicated the 9-2 record of the previous year and improved to 7-1 in the MEAC, with the lone league loss coming at the hands of eventual champion and nationally ranked Hampton.

Followed by a couple of 7-4 records in 2006 and 2007, the Bulldogs had 10-win seasons in each of the next two campaigns - 2008 (10-3) and 2009 (10-2). SC State was also a perfect 8-0 in the MEAC both years.

Pough has coached several players who have gone on to play in the National Football League, including nine who are currently on NFL rosters - Joe Thomas (Chicago Bears), Pro Bowl nose tackle Javon Hargrave (San Francisco 49ers), Alex Taylor (Cleveland Browns), Antonio Hamilton (Arizona Cardinals), Decobie Durant (L.A. Rams) and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year and Pro Bowl linebacker Darius Leonard (Indianapolis Colts).

Prior to taking the reins at South Carolina State, Pough spent five seasons as an assistant at the University of South Carolina (USC), the last three as a running backs coach under Lou Holtz. During his stint at USC, he helped build the Gamecocks into one of the top offensive teams in the SEC. USC made back-to-back appearances in the Outback Bowl in 2000 and 2001. Before going to USC, Pough was one of the top high school coaches in the Palmetto State, leading Fairfield-Central to a perfect 15-0 record in 1996 and claiming the Class AAA state title. He earned South Carolina High School League (SCHSL) Coach-of-the-Year honors for his efforts, the first of three such honors. Pough also had coaching stints at Keenan High in Columbia, where he built the Raiders into one of the top-Class AAA teams in the state.

In his final two seasons (1973 and 1974) as a player for SC State, the Orangeburg native and former offensive lineman helped the Bulldogs to a 15-7-1 record, a league crown and back-to-back postseason appearances. After graduating in 1975, he joined the staff at nearby Orangeburg-Wilkinson High (1976-79), before returning to his alma mater as an assistant coach in 1979. The Bulldogs made consecutive trips to the Div. 1-AA playoffs (1981 and 1982) during his tenure as an assistant.

Pough and his wife, Josie are the parents of two sons - Oliver "Bud" IV and Lee Judson - and a daughter-in-law, Dr. Natalie Odom Pough.

Pough has two granddaughters, Taylor Michelle and Olivia Grace.














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

Alma Mater: **JACKSON STATE UNIVERSITY** Elayne Hayes Anthony, Ph.D., was named acting president of Jackson State University in March 2023. A native of Jackson, Mississippi, she was the first African American female anchor, producer and reporter for WJTV-TV12, the CBS affiliate in Jackson.

Anthony is the former dean of JSU's School of Journalism and chair of the Department of Journalism and Media Studies. Under her leadership, the department received national accreditation from the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications.

Additionally, she expanded their sequence offerings to include public relations and advertising, and added an additional radio station "The Sipp." She also helped to garner close to \$1 million in grants for WJSU.

Anthony has been appointed the assistant superintendent of Public Information and Staff Development for the Jackson Public School District, Anthony later joined

Belhaven University as the founding head of the Department of Communication.

A former tenured full professor at Belhaven University. Anthony is currently a tenured full professor at JSU. She has served on more than 15 accreditation teams for the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications.

Anthony was appointed to the Mississippi Education Task Force. She was also appointed by Governor Haley Barbour and Governor Phil Bryant to the State Department of Health, where she serves on the Audit Committee, CON and Communication Committee.

Anthony is the first African American to serve on the Board of the Mississippi Association of Broadcasters, where she is the vice president. She will assume the position of MAB president in Fall 2023. Anthony will be the first African American female and educator to hold the statewide position.



ASHLEY ROBINSON **VICE PRESIDENT & DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**

Entering his sixth year at Jackson State University, Vice President / Director of Athletics Ashley Robinson continues to lead Tiger Athletics to new heights.

A two-time National Athletic Director of the Year (2023) Black Student-Athlete Summit AD of The Year; 2022 Cushman & Wakefield AD of the Year awarded by the National Association of College Directors of Athletics (NACDA), Robinson's leadership helped JSU Athletics win the C.D. Henry Award for the best all-around men's sports programs in the SWAC in 2022-23.

A trio of Robinson's football hires, all first-time college head coaches at the time, earned postseason play in Fall 2021. Willie Simmons led Florida A&M to an at-large berth in the FCS Playoffs. Eric Dooley led Prairie View A&M to a SWAC Championship game appearance in 2021.

Robinson and JSU leadership's decision to name Pro Football Hall of Famer Deion Sanders as head coach transformed college football, as JSU went 27-6 in three seasons, with back-to-back SWAC titles and consecutive Celebration Bowl Appearances.

Robinson has led JSU Athletics to 19 championships during his tenure, highlighted by men's basketball (2021), baseball (2021), football (fall 2021 and 2022), and women's basketball (2022), each going undefeated in conference play.

A native of Jackson, Miss., Robinson spent five years at Prairie View A&M, where he was named Director of Athletics in June 2013, and promoted to Vice President and Director of Athletics in November 2016.

A former student-athlete, he was a four-year letterman in basketball and is the single-season and career recordholder in assists after playing point guard for Mississippi Valley State.

Robinson was named athletic director at Mississippi Valley State in 2012, where he spent nine months leading Delta Devil Athletics, leading MVSU to five conference titles and designing the Harrison HPER Complex.

Robinson currently serves as chair of SWAC's Athletic Directors Committee. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. He received a bachelor's degree from MVSU and master's degree at the United States Sports Academy.

Robinson has three daughters, Ashlynn, Paisley and Promise, and a son Jalen.

One of the greatest Jackson State Football Tigers to ever don the Blue and White has ascended to the position of Head Coach at his alma mater.

T.C. TAYLOR has been named the 22nd head coach for JSU football. He officially took the reins of the program. following the conclusion of the Celebration Bowl.

The former JSU quarterback and wide receiver has been a part of the Jackson State football staff since 2019, coaching tight ends and wide receivers, and has played a key role in an historic run over the past two seasons of Tiger football.

JSU has posted a 23-3 record over the past two seasons, winning back-to-back Southwestern Athletic Conference championships and posting consecutive undefeated conference seasons.

As an assistant coach at JSU, Taylor has helped develop some of the best receivers in the SWAC. During the abbreviated Spring 2021 season, he tutored WR Daylen Baldwin, who led the SWAC in receiving yards (540) and touchdowns (seven). During the Fall 2021 season, Malachi Wideman tied for the conference lead with 12 touchdown receptions, while Keith Corbin ranked second in both receptions (69) and yards (921) and tied for seventh in touchdowns.

In 2022, Dallas Daniels ranks second in the SWAC in receptions (60), third in receiving yards (666). and fourth in touchdowns (six). Shane Hooks ranks third in the SWAC in receptions (59) and third in both receiving yards (705) and receiving touchdowns (10). Prior to the 2022 season, Taylor was selected for an NFL coaching fellowship with the Tennessee Titans.

A native of McComb, Miss., Taylor played quarterback and wide receiver at Jackson State from 1998-2001. starting off as a signal caller for two-and-a-half seasons before switching to wide receiver. In just 19 games as a receiver, he amassed 188 catches for 1.793 vards.

As a senior at Jackson State, Taylor broke the JSU single-season record with 84 receptions for 1.234 yards and 11 touchdowns, earning NCAA Division I-AA Third-Team All-America honors from The Sports Network and First-Team Black College All-America recognition from Sheridan Broadcasting Network. He was also the runner-up for the 2001 Conerly Trophy. presented to Mississippi's top college football player. behind Eli Manning.

Prior to returning to JSU as assistant coach in 2019. Taylor coached at North Carolina Central from 2014-18, where he coached quarterbacks and served as offensive coordinator.

At NCCU, Taylor helped guide the Eagles to three MEAC championships (2014, 2015, 2016), and in 2016 went unbeaten in conference play and qualified for the Air Force Reserve Celebration Bowl.

In 2016 and under Taylor's guidance, NCCU set a record for total offense in a single season (4,614). Also, in 2014, Taylor's unit set a program record for passes completed in a season (227).

From 2014 to 2018. Taylor coached 28 All-MEAC offensive players and five All-Americans. In 2016 and under Taylor's tutoring, Malcolm Bell was a finalist for the 2016 Black College Football Player of the Year. Bell was also a three-time All-MEAC quarterback (2014, 2015, 2016) and set the program record for total offense (7,844 yards) and career completion percentage (56.6 percent) and was second in passing yards (6,340).

Taylor spent the prior two seasons (2012-13) at Texas Southern University as wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator.

From 2005-11, he coached at Coahoma Community College in Clarksdale, Miss., starting as the quarterbacks and wide receivers coach and spending the final six years as offensive coordinator. His offenses ranked among the top five in Mississippi junior colleges in total yards for four straight seasons from 2007-10.

Taylor signed as a rookie free agent with the New England Patriots in 2002, played wide receiver for the NFL Europe World Bowl XI champion Frankfurt Galaxy in 2003, and participated in the 2003 NFL preseason with the Detroit Lions before a nagging injury ended his playing career.

Taylor graduated from Jackson State with a bachelor's degree in health, physical education, and recreation in 2005. He is married to Dawn, and they have two sons, Tre and Tylan.

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

MARCHING 101

The South Carolina State "Marching 101" band is known from coast to coast. The members have entertained tens of thousands of spectators throughout the Southeast and millions by way of nationally televised events — including professional football games — with a unique style of marching that takes hours of practice to master.

Band members play without music scores, although only a percentage of the members are music majors. They are perpetually in motion with dance routines and geometric designs while remaining in step, and of course, playing music all the time.

The band's name, the "Marching 101" is a misnomer as the 2008 edition of the renowned group.

For many youngsters throughout the state, the band is South Carolina State University. They may not be aware of all of the academic opportunities of the institution, but they respond to the exciting music of the "Marching 101."

The band, which is currently under the direction of Dr. Patrick Moore, was organized in 1918 as a "regimental band," performing military drills and assisting with music in the college Sunday School and other special occasions.

In 1924, the late Reginald Thomason influenced the music presentation with concerts. From 1924 on, a succession of directors, including Thomason, influenced the growth of the band as it became a part of the Department of Music at the university. In the 1940s, the band shared uniforms with the ROTC brigade, and played in military ceremonies as well as collegiate functions. In 1955, the college band numbered around 45 members — about one-seventh of today's number — and sported its own garnet and blue uniforms.

Moore, who took over as director five years ago, has continued the tradition of fine entertainment, especially at football games.

While other college football fans head for the concession stands at halftime, followers of the Bulldogs remain seated to enjoy the next exciting routines of the "Marching 101," which are always appropriate for the game.

The band learns a completely new show for every home game. Fans enthusiastically reward their excellent and breathtaking performances with applause and cheers.

Although most of the members hang up their uniforms when the football season is over, many of them will contribute their musical skills in various ways the remainder of the year, including participation in the pep band, concert choir and jazz band.

THE SONIC BOOM OF THE SOUTH

BAND DIRECTOR DR. RODFRICK LITTLE

Although Dr. F. D. Hall served as director of the band, chorus, and orchestra in the 1920s, the marching band began in the 1940s with students from both Jackson State College and Lanier High School under Mr. Kermit Holly, Sr. The Jackson State University Marching Band, affectionately known as the "Sonic Boom of the South," is known for intricate, precision marching and the big band sound. The "Sonic Boom," also referred to as "Hollywood's Band of Choice," has performed many halftime appearances for the NFL/NBA, including the Atlanta Falcons, Detroit Lions, New Orleans Saints, Cincinnati Bengals, and the NBA All-Star game in 1991.

The "Boom" was featured in a television special for Motown's 30th Anniversary and the 34th NAACP Image Awards, with a special guest performance by "Cedric the Entertainer." In May 2013, the band was featured in a Headline News (HLN) special chronicling what it takes to become a Drum Major at Jackson State University. Since 2020, the band has been featured in several media outlets, a nationally televised Pepsi commercial, the YouTube (company) platform, and President Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris's (virtual) Inauguration.

Students in the band dubbed the Jackson State University Marching Band "The Sonic Boom of the South" in 1971. "The thrill of a thousand eves" were the words Dr. Jimmie James, Jr., spoke at the onset of the "Prancing Jaycettes" in 1971. Shirley Middleton, a former majorette, initiated the concept of the majorettes abandoning their batons and dancing to popular musical selections. As the majorette sponsor, Shirley Middleton and the majorettes met with Dr. John A. Peoples, the University's sixth president, and requested that they be permitted to "put down their batons." In 1974, the band's theme song, "Get Ready," an old Motown favorite, was selected, and three years after that, the "Tiger Run-On" was perfected. The "Tiger Run-On" is a fast, eye-catching shuffle that brings fans to their feet during halftime performances.

The band is under the direction of Dr. Roderick Little, and the Prancing J-Settes is under the direction of Mrs. Chloe Ashley-Crowley. The Jackson State University Marching Band, "The Sonic Boom of the South," is an ensemble of the Department of Music, Dr. Beckley-Roberts, Chair.


