TIFFANY GREENE PLAY-BY-PLAY

Tiffany Greene is a play-by-play commentator for ESPN, covering a variety of collegiate sports basketball, football, softball and volleyball. She is the first African-American woman to serve as a play-by-play commentator for college football on ESPN.

Greene has called a number of postseason games including the NCAA Women's Division I Basketball Tournament, NCAA Softball Regional and Super Regionals, as well as NCAA Volleyball Regionals.

Greene originally began working with ESPN as a college football sideline reporter in 2012. She has since worked on the Women's College World Series, Air Force Reserve Bowl on ABC and multiple bowl games.

Prior to ESPN, Greene honed her skills as a playby-play announcer and sports reporter at Bright House Sports Network in the Orlando and Tampa Bay markets. During that time, she was the playby-play announcer for the inaugural season of BIG EAST women's basketball on Fox Sports 1.

Greene is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Links Incorporated and the National Association of Black Journalists. She began her on-air career in 2004 as a one-man band reporter at WJCL/ WTGS, and later, WTOC in Savannah, Georgia.

Greene earned her Bachelor's degree in Broadcast Journalism from the Florida A&M University. She serves as the FAMU School of Journalism & Graphic Communication Board of Visitors co-chair.



ANALYST

Jay Walker joined ESPN in 2005 as a college football analyst. He has called the ESPNU Thursday Night games for the last four years, in addition to a studio analyst for the last two years. He has also been an analyst on College Football Overdrive.

Walker started his television career with BET and then joined the now defunct MBC Network from 2002-05

Out of college, Walker was drafted in the seventh round in 1994 by the New England Patriots, where he played for two seasons. He also spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings.

Walker was drafted out of high school to be a pitcher in the California Angels organization's minor league team, one of a handful of players to play both minor league baseball and in the NFL. While playing in the minors, Walker decided to pursue his passion for football and was recruited as a quarterback to Long Beach State and eventually transferred to Howard

University after football was cut as a sport at Long Beach. At Howard, Walker led the team to their first playoff berth in team history and was named an All-American, to the All-MEAC Team twice and was the I-AA football player of the year by Sports Illustrated. That year, 1993, Howard earned its only undefeated season in program history.

A native of Los Angeles. Walker is a 1994 graduate from Howard with a political science degree. In 2005, he was inducted into the Howard University Athletics Hall of Fame, and most recently, he was named to the MEAC/SWAC All-Time Greatest Team.

Currently, Walker is CEO and President of Walker Financial Services and has been a member of the House of Delegates in Maryland since 1997. He serves on the House Ways and Means Committee and its education and finance resources subcommittees. He is also a member of the Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland.



OUINT KESSENICH REPORTER

Quint Kessenich began at ESPN in 1993 covering men's lacrosse. He currently serves as a lacrosse analyst and college sports reporter, working on football and wrestling.

Kessenich works on television's most extensive college lacrosse package - featuring regularseason action and the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship, an event he has covered since 1995. He also works as an analyst on Major League Lacrosse games on ESPN2 and ESPN3.

Under his reporting duties, Kessenich covers college football and the NCAA Division I Wrestling Championship.

Since joining the company, his responsibilities expanded to high school football, men's college basketball and various NCAA championships, including track and field, and soccer. He established the ESPNU Lacrosse Podcast in 2010, and it quickly became the industry leader for lacrosse news. He was also a frequent contributor to ESPNU.com. In addition, he has covered the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes for ESPN and ABC.

Kessenich contributes to Inside Lacrosse Magazine. and is actively involved with "First Stick", a nonprofit that introduces urban schools and athletes to the game of lacrosse. He was also a columnist on college lacrosse for the Baltimore Sun.

Kessenich played one year of professional lacrosse with the Baltimore Thunder in 1999, and at the amateur level for the storied Mount Washington Lacrosse Club.

A four-time all-American goalkeeper, Kessenich was a two-time winner of the Ensign C. Markland Kelly, Jr., Award as the nation's best goalie. A 1990 graduate of Johns Hopkins University, Kessenich remained in Baltimore where he has been an assistant lacrosse coach at the Boys' Latin School, a perennial national power since 1992.

He is a member of the Johns Hopkins Athletic Hall of Fame, as well as the Long Island Chapter and the Baltimore Chapter of USA Lacrosse Hall of Fame.

Gallop covers a lot of ground in the secondary. He had 39 solo and 59 total tackles. In addition, he demonstrated his ability with great pass coverage grabbing two interceptions. Gallop led the Bison to the MEAC championship and to the Celebration Bowl last season.



ERICK HUNTER

MORGAN STATE | LINEBACKER 6-4, 210 lbs | SENIOR

Hunter is one of the most talented linebackers in the country. He has good anticipation. He's capable of making several open field tackles with his quickness and range. Hunter had 47 solo and 75 total tackles along with three sacks and two interceptions.



ELIJAH WILLIAMS

MORGAN STATE | DEFENSIVE LINEMAN 6-3, 270 lbs | SENIOR

Williams has excellent footwork and quickness. He can play the run and get to the passer. He led the MEAC with seven sacks. He also had 31 solo and 50 total tackles

Hunter has made a big difference as a rusher and a receiver out of the backfield. The multi-talented running back leads Howard's offense. Hunter had 142 carries for 626 yards with nine rushing touchdowns. He had 26 receptions for 257 yards and two receiving TDs. Hunter's exploits brought him Preseason MEAC Offensive Player of the Year honors.



DAYLAN LONG

NORFOLK STATE | LINEBACKER 5-11, 190lbs | REDSHIRT JUNIOR

Long is one of the great all-around defenders in the league. He has the ability with his speed and tackling skills. Long had 27 solo and 41 total tackles with three sacks and one interception. Long is primed to have another big year.

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KICKOFF PREVIEW

FAMILIAR FOES BATTLE FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE 2019

The 19th Cricket MEAC/SWAC Challenge Kickoff figures to be an intriguing matchup and a delight for HBCU fans.

You have the Rattlers of Florida A&M, the reigning Cricket Celebration Bowl and HBCU national champions, representing the SWAC, and the Spartans of Norfolk State from the MEAC, who are looking to take the next step after coming off a losing season.

Despite FAMU's storied history on the gridiron, first year head coach James Colzie III leads the Rattlers, taking over for the highly successful Willie Simmons who left Tallahassee (Fla.) to become an assistant coach at Duke University. Colzie served as the Rattlers' defensive coordinator the past two seasons.

Despite losing key players through graduation, including 2023 SWAC Player of the Year quarterback Jeremy Moussa, Colzie feels confident about the return of some graduate seniors and transfers to compete for another championship.

"There are obviously high expectations with this program," says Colzie. "We have players who have been through the wars and know what it takes to continue the success of the program."

Colzie says that they will go into camp and decide whether the starting quarterback will be red-shirt sophomore Ja'Cory Jordan or transfer Daniel Richardson, who passed for over 7,000 yards at Central Michigan and Florida Atlantic.

Whoever gets the nod at the position will have experienced support. Red-shirt senior running back Kelvin Dean Jr. will lead the ground attack. A second team all-SWAC preseason selection, Dean Jr. finished the season with 376 yards and 3 TDs. Senior wide receiver Jamari Gassett, also a second team selection, will be a factor in the pass game. The senior grabbed 24 passes for 320 yards and three TDs. Ashton Grable, a red-shirt junior offensive lineman, is one of the best in the SWAC as proven by his first team selection.


Colzie adds that there will have to be some adjustments made on offense as his strength was on the defensive side. That unit is led by three graduates in defensive lineman Allen Smith Jr. and defensive backs Deco Wilson and All America graduate safety Kendall Bohler.

Smith proved to be one of the top defensive lineman in the SWAC last year, making 30 tackles, 5.5 behind the line of scrimmage and 3.5 for sacks.

Wilson, a preseason first team selection had an outstanding 2023 season, collecting 39 tackles and three interceptions. But Colzie feels like the ultimate key to the success of the defense will revolve around the play of Bohler, who has proven to be equally adept as a tackler with 39 and as a pass defender with 14 pass breakups.

"He's a leader for us and a key to our success on defense," says Colzie, of Bohler, rated the seventh best defensive back in college football. "He is a big body. He's not just one of the best in the SWAC; he is one









of the best in the country. And because he is a graduate, it is important what he brings to the locker room. If we are doing well on defense, a lot will be because of his impact."

It is important to note that FAMU has one of the most dependable place kickers in the FCS in graduate Cameron Gillis. A first team all-SWAC selection, he accounted for 71 points, connecting on 10 of 12 field goals and a perfect 41 of 41 on PATs.

Norfolk State, on the other hand, feels that it has a lot to prove following a 3-8 record, 1-4 in the MEAC. The young Spartans were competitive but could not close out games, suffering five losses by only one score.

Odums is in his fourth season as head coach of the Spartans. The veteran coach had success at both Clark University and at Southern University before coming to the Tidewater. He has a 75-66 career record in 13 seasons and has five SWAC titles during his career at Southern.

it is a process," explained Odums. "Last year we lost a number of games that were close. Losing is sometimes a part of that process. I feel good about the returning team and how they have learned from close games. The big thing about playing in a game (MEAC/SWAC Challenge) of this magnitude is not getting caught up in the moment. We want to avoid that, trust the process and go 1–0."

"Any time you build a winning program,

Odums has reason to be encouraged as the Spartans, who were picked fifth in the MEAC pre-season poll, return 18 of 21 on offense and 19 of 21 on a talented young defense. Quarterback is a key position in the success of a football team. If that is the case, Norfolk State should be in good shape with the return of senior signal caller Otto Kuhn.

A first team selection, Kuhn passed for 1,244 yards and 12 TDs while posing a double threat with 254 yards and three TDs. Junior Kevon King leads the ground attack with 429 yards and 5 TDs.

The strength of the team lies in its defense, where it boasts eight players on the preseason first and second teams. While talented, the unit is still young. That is where graduate defensive back Devon Allen comes in.

"Devon Allen will certainly be a key for us," noted Odums. "He has been here and decided not to transfer, and that says a lot in this day and time of the portal transfer. He has finished his undergrad and is a graduate student. That means a lot in the locker room."

SERIES RECORD:

Jackson State defeated SC State, 37-7 last year to extend the SWAC lead to two in row; however, the MEAC maintains an 11-6 advantage in the 17 previous meetings. FAMU is a former member of the MEAC. The Rattlers and the Spartans met 16 times from 1997 until 2019. The Rattlers won the last two meetings in 2018 and 2019. The Spartans last won, 35-28 in 2017. ■

DR. JAVAUNE ADAMS-GASTON **PRESIDENT**

Dr. Javaune Adams-Gaston is the seventh President of Norfolk State University. She began her tenure on June 24, 2019. As President, she is committed to ensuring that Norfolk State University fulfills its mission as an HBCU for the modern world, a university grounded by its heritage, focused on the future, and deeply committed to student success. Her vision is opportunity, access, affordability, growth, sustainability, and student excellence. A strong advocate for collaboration and developing strategic partnerships with local, regional, and state and national stakeholders, Dr. Adams-Gaston is committed to cultivating strong connections in the university, among alumni and in the community.

Under President Adams-Gaston's leadership, Norfolk State University has successfully achieved the status of a U.S. News and World Report 2020, 2021, and 2022 Top 20 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) designation. The University attained 10-year reaffirmation of accreditation by its major accrediting body. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). This reaffirmation underscores the University's strength, stability, and forward momentum. Enrollment increased to a six-year high in Fall 2022 to 5785 students. The University realized record high operating revenues 104% above projection, the highest in the history of Norfolk State. And Dr. Adams-Gaston has been successful in acquiring multiple donations, including a transformational gift of over \$40 million from Mackenzie Scott, the largest single

donor gift in the history of NSU. The University has also raised over \$11 million for the 2022 calendar year, to support student initiatives.

Since President Adams-Gaston's arrival, Norfolk State University has also expanded its online academic program curriculum to include a master's degree in Cybersecurity and has been recognized nationally and designated as a Department of Defense Center of Excellence in Cybersecurity and Department of Energy Cybersecurity Consortium Leader. Under her leadership, the online master's degree in Cyber Psychology, the first in the nation, launched in Fall 2020 in connection with Academic Partnerships. The University has secured grants of more than \$53 million for scholarships and financial support to enhance student success during her tenure. Her strategic planning has also helped to secure transformational partnerships with the Sentara Healthcare- Public Health Program, Appalachian School of Law 3+3 program, Academic Partnerships, Dominion Energy, Micron Technology, Inc., Landmark, Netflix, 2U, Apple, Amazon, USAA, and the Pharrell Williams Black Ambition Prize, Mighty Dream, and many others.

A recognized higher education leader, President Adams-Gaston is an invited speaker nationally and internationally. Her appointments and honors have included: President Biden's Appointment to the Board of Advisors on Historically Black Colleges and Universities, NCAA Board of Governors, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) Board of Trustees, among many other boards.



MELODY WEBB **DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**

Melody Webb was appointed to the position of University Athletics Director on July 1, 2020, after serving for six years at NSU as Senior Associate Athletics Director for Administration/ Senior Woman Administrator. She became the ninth athletics director in the history of Norfolk State, and the first female to hold the role.

Since stepping into the position, Norfolk State has reached new heights throughout the department. The Spartans have won 16 Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) titles, including five in the 2023-24 academic year.

The Norfolk State women's basketball team secured its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance with a thrilling victory over Howard in the MEAC Championship game. Just over a week later, the Spartan men's basketball team won the CIT Championship, erasing an 18-point deficit to defeat Purdue-Fort Wayne in the final.

Norfolk State's track & field and cross country programs racked up conference titles during the 2023-24 campaign. Both the men's and women's

cross country teams dominated the MEAC championship meet, before the Spartans secured a sweep of the indoor and outdoor crowns on the men's side.

Norfolk State was also selected to host four NCAA Track & Field Indoor Championships from 2023-26, including the Division I championship in 2025.

A native of Chicago, Ill., Webb earned her bachelor's degree in business administration with a concentration in accounting from Savannah State University, where she was a four-year letter winner in volleyball, serving as team captain for three years. Webb also competed in basketball and track and field where she also received conference honors. After completing her undergraduate degree, she then earned her master's in public administration with a focus in public policy and management from Bowie State University. Webb is pursuing a Doctorate of Education from the United States Sports Academy.

COACHING STAFF



DAWSON ODUMS HEAD COACH

Dawson Odums, a championship coach with a track record of developing student-athletes both on and off the field during his collegiate coaching career, enters his fourth year as the head football coach at Norfolk State University in 2024. He was named the 18th head coach in Spartan history on April 21, 2021.

Norfolk State continued to build up its program in 2023, taking significant strides in several key areas on the stat sheet. While the Spartans finished the season with three wins, the team remained competitive every week. Five of Norfolk State's losses came by one score. Six Spartans earned All-MEAC accolades in 2023, headlined by promising freshman AJ Richardson.

The Spartans fought the injury bug throughout the 2022 season but still landed nine players on All-MEAC teams, led by linebacker Tyler Long's first team selection.

Odums led NSU to a successful campaign in his first season in charge. The Spartans went 6-5 in 2021, which included a six-game winning streak that was the program's longest since 1984. Officially, the 2021 season marked NSU's first winning ledger since 2007.

The Spartans had a school-record 18 players earn All-MEAC honors following the 2021 season. That included NSU capturing three of the MEAC's top awards – Offensive Player of the Year (Juwan Carter). Rookie of the Year

(J.J. Davis) and Offensive Lineman of the Year (Justin Redd).

A native of Shelby, North Carolina, Odums has more than 20 years of collegiate coaching experience. Most recently, Odums enjoyed a stellar 10-year run in the Southwestern Athletic Conference at Southern University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Odums directed Southern to a winning record in each of his eight full seasons at the helm of the program, including a 5-1 mark in the abbreviated 2021 spring season. In his last five seasons, the Jaguars posted a 29-6 SWAC record. His overall record with the Jaguars was 63-35.

After joining the Jaguars as defensive line coach in 2011, Odums was elevated to interim head coach two games into the 2012 season before earning the permanent head coach position following the year. On the field, Odums led Southern to a 53–17 SWAC mark over the last nine seasons. His ledger includes one SWAC championship (2013), one SWAC Coach of the Year honor (2013) and four SWAC West Division titles (2013, '14, '18, '19).

The 2013 season was a special one for Odums. His first full year as head coach at Southern culminated in a double-overtime SWAC championship game victory over Jackson State. The win made Odums just the second coach in Southern history to win a SWAC divisional title, outright SWAC championship and SWAC Coach of the Year honors in his first year as head coach.

Seven players coached by Odums have signed with teams in the NFL or CFL. That list includes SWAC all-time leading rusher Lenard Tillery and Southern's all-time leader in receiving yards and return touchdowns, Willie Quinn. That list includes two-time All-MEAC defensive end De'Shaan Dixon, who signed as an undrafted free agent with the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars last year, after finishing his career as a Spartan.

Odums' other coaching stints include a pair of stops in the MEAC. He spent three seasons at North Carolina A&T (2008–10), serving first as defensive line coach and special teams coordinator and then as defensive coordinator.

Odums' first stint in the MEAC came as defensive line coach at Bethune–Cookman from 2005–07. Over Odums' three-year span there, the Wildcats run defense was among the stingiest in the MEAC. In 2007, the Wildcats defense ranked third in the conference in rush defense and third in total defense. Odums also worked with the Wildcats special teams units and scouted opposing teams' special teams personnel.

Prior to arriving at Bethune-Cookman, Odums spent three seasons at Division II Clark Atlanta. He served as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator from 2002-03, then as interim head coach in 2004.

Odums' other stints at the Division I level include two years at Georgia Southern and one at Gardner-Webb. In his first year at GSU in 2000, Odums coached the linebackers while helping the Eagles win the Division I-AA (now FCS) national championship. He then mentored the defensive ends in his second year.

Odums played linebacker and quarterback at Crest High School in Boiling Springs, North Carolina, before competing collegiately at North Carolina Central. A defensive lineman at NCCU, Odums was a team captain and All-CIAA selection as a senior. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1997.

A member of the American Football Coaches Association, Odums participated in the NCAA Coaches Academy in Indianapolis in 2010.

Odums and his wife, Audrey, have two daughters, Jasmine and Jaiden.



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

TIMOTHY BEARD
INTERIM PRESIDENT

Dr. Timothy Beard's professional profile epitomizes an individual who has fully realized his potential in education and community service. A native of Port St. Joe, FL, and an honor graduate of Port St. Joe High School, Dr. Beard began his academic journey at Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU) in 1980.

Holding undergraduate degrees from both FAMU and Florida State University (FSU), Dr. Beard earned a Ph.D. from FSU in 1998 in Rehabilitation Counseling with a focus on Higher Education Administration. He has also pursued studies at the Christian International Educational Institute in Northwest Florida.

Dr. Beard commenced his distinguished career in secondary education in 1984 with Leon County Schools as an Instructional Assistant. As a graduate student at FSU from 1985–1987, he served as a Career Advisor and Analyst. From 1987–1989, he worked as a Disability Analyst with the Office of Disability Determinations in Tallahassee. He returned to Higher Education at FAMU in 1989 as an Assistant Director of the Career Center. From 1990–1999, Dr. Beard held several roles at the joint FAMU–FSU College of Engineering, including Director of Career Services, Director of Instructional Research, Director of Minority Student Affairs, Instructor, and Director of Graduate Student Services.

In 1999, Dr. Beard was appointed Assistant Professor of Health Care Management and Director of Student Affairs in the School of Allied Health Sciences at FAMU. In 2001, he was recognized by his colleagues, President Frederick Humphries, and the University's administration as "Teacher of the Year." In 2000, Dr. Beard was appointed by Governor Jeb Bush to the State Board of Independent Colleges and Universities, providing oversight to more than 300 Florida and foreign private colleges and universities.

Dr. Beard's career reached new heights in 2003, when he became the first African American senior administrator in the history of the University of

South Alabama in Mobile. There, he served as Dean and Vice-President of Student Affairs from 2003-2007. From 2007-2015, Dr. Beard was the Vice-President of Student Development and Enrollment Management at Pasco-Hernando Community College (PHCC), now Pasco Hernando State College (PHSC). Under his leadership, the college's enrollment increased by over 40 percent, and several PHSC programs were recognized by the Association of Florida Colleges as "Exemplary Best Practices." In March 2015, Dr. Beard reached the pinnacle of his career when the Pasco-Hernando State College Board of Trustees appointed him as the College's fourth president. He served in this role for nearly nine years, retiring in January 2024. Dr. Beard now holds the title of President Emeritus.

Dr. Beard's professional associations and community involvement include serving on numerous boards and advisory councils in several Florida cities, including Tampa, Ocala, Gainesville, Brooksville, Spring Hill, and New Port Richey. His board and council appointments include the Florida College System Council of Presidents (Vice-Chair 2022, Chair 2023), the Impact Center Board of Directors (Vice-President) Tampa, Enduring Faith Ministries Board of Directors-Gainesville, Pasco-Hernando Workforce Board, the Pasco Economic Development Council, and the State of Florida Credential Review Committee.

Throughout his career, Dr. Beard has been a trailblazer, mentor, and advocate for educational excellence. His contributions to state government and higher education have created a legacy, inspiring future generations to strive for greatness.

Dr. Beard has been married to Wendy Beard for 38 years. They are proud parents of two daughters: Briana Beard Belle (married to Jeffrey, a FAMU alum), who holds a Doctor of Pharmacy degree from FAMU, and Sierra Beard, who earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Healthcare Management from FAMU and a Master of Public Health from the University of Georgia.



TIFFANI-DAWN SYKESV.P. / DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Tiffani-Dawn Sykes became the vice president and director of intercollegiate athletics at Florida A&M on January 4, 2023. Under her leadership, the Rattlers achieved notable successes, both athletically and academically. In her first six months, the women's tennis and baseball teams won their first SWAC championships. During the 2023-24 academic year, the football and golf teams secured two HBCU National Championships in the same year, a first for the department. The cross country, football, and women's indoor track & field teams also won their first SWAC titles. Five other teams finished second in their respective SWAC tournaments.

The department excelled academically off the field, achieving six perfect 1,000 scores in the 2022–23 Academic Progress Rate (APR) report, the highest in department history. Sykes also spearheaded the renaming of key facilities and brought the 2023 Florida High School Athletics

Association (FHSAA) Football State Championships back to Bragg Memorial Stadium for the first time since 1978. She launched the department's first digital streaming platform, Rattlers+, and its first athletics app.

Before Florida A&M, Sykes was the executive senior associate athletics director at Dartmouth College, where she oversaw 35 Division I varsity sports and managed various department functions. She handled player eligibility issues during the COVID-19 pandemic and helped bring the NCAA Skiing Championships to Hanover in 2025. Her previous roles include assistant athletics director for compliance at Grambling State and positions at Norfolk State, Chowan University, and Saint Paul's College. Sykes holds a master's degree in sport administration and has been actively involved in several NCAA committees and professional associations.



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

COACHING STAFF



JAMES COLZIE III HEAD COACH

James Colzie III was named the 19th head football coach at Florida A&M University, January 27, 2024.

Colzie has worked and played for some of the best coaches in the business, including Bobby Bowden, Mickey Andrews, Romeo Crennel, Emmitt Thomas, Blake Nill, and Kevin Steele. His career has included stops at elite Division I, Division II, U-Sport, and NJCAA football programs around the Southeast, Midwest, and Canada. As a collegiate player and coach, he has been a part of four national championships and seven conference titles.

Colzie was elevated to head coach after serving as the interim head coach following the departure of Willie Simmons. Colzie joined Florida A&M ahead of the 2022 season, where he led the cornerbacks and contributed to a defense that ranked in the top 25 in six categories.

After the 2022 campaign, Colzie was promoted to assistant head coach while coaching the cornerbacks again. Leading the cornerbacks, the Rattlers saw two selected to the All-SWAC teams, Kendall Bohler and Eric Smith. Colzie was again part of one of the nation's best defenses, ranking top 25 in 12 categories. Colzie was also part of a historic Rattlers team that won its first–ever SWAC Championship and Celebration Bowl with a 12-1 record.

Before FAMU

In 2022, Colzie left his post as the head football coach at Saint Mary's University (Canada) with an overall record of 23-19. Saint Mary's played for two AUS Championships (2018 and 2019) and posted a conference-best 7-1 record during the 2018 season. In total, Colzie posted six All-Canadians (defensive back DeAndre Smith (2016), defensive back Antoine Lyte-Myers (2019), defensive back Justin Julien (2021), returner Johnny King, returner Justin Julien (2021), defensive end Jadarius Caesar (2017), and linebacker Brad Herbst (2018). He developed and coached four CFL draft picks, starting in 2018 with defensive lineman Tresor Mafuta (4th round to Saskatchewan), in 2021 with linebacker Jarek Richards (4th round to Hamilton) and offensive lineman Peter Kourtis (5th round to Edmonton), and defensive back Adrian Greene (4th round to BC). During Colzie's time at Saint Mary's, he also had four Player of the Year's (two being Defensive Player of the Year) and a final total of twenty All-Conference players while serving as the head football coach.

Before becoming head coach at Saint Mary's, Colzie spent two seasons at the University of British Columbia as their defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach. In 2015, Colzie helped the Thunderbirds win their first Vanier Cup Championship since 1997. The Thunderbirds' defense finished ranked 2nd in the Canada West Conference in rushing defense, pass defense, and scoring defense.

Before the University of British Columbia, Colzie spent one season at Coffeyville. The defense at Coffeyville finished 1st in the nation with seven interceptions for touchdowns and 1st in the nation with ten total defensive touchdowns and 3rd down percentage (22%).

In 2013, Colzie was the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at Simon Fraser University. There, he took over a defense that had finished dead last in all major conference defensive categories during the 2012 season, and under his defense, they finished second in pass defense, second in opponents 1st down, third in third down, and fourth down conversions. Colzie had three 1st Team All-Conference players and an All-Region player.

From 2007 to 2012, Colzie had success in multiple Division II football programs (Southern Arkansas, University of West Georgia and Valdosta State), where he coached six All-Americans and ten All-Conference players. In three of those years, his special teams were ranked first in the nation in punt return yards and touchdowns.

During the 2004–2006 seasons, Coach Colzie worked as a Defensive Graduate Assistant at Florida State, where he coached cornerbacks that included first-round picks Antonio Cromartie (2006), Patrick Robinson (2010), and second-round pick Bryant McFadden (2005).

James Colzie III began his coaching career in 2000 at Florida International University, where he coached the cornerbacks and was also the co-special teams coordinator working with returners. Before Florida International, in his playing days, he enjoyed the success of being a two-sport athlete at Florida State University. He played from 1993–1997 on the football team and lettered on the baseball team in 1994. Colzie was part of the Florida State 1993 National Championship team and three ACC Championship teams.





The "Legion" consists of 250 staff and student musicians, dancers, and flags from states nationwide, including the Virgin Islands and the Bahamas. The "Legion" exhibits a presence evocative of the storied "Spartans". They are regally attired in forest green uniforms with contrasting white overlays, gold capes and brilliant gold-plated helmets. Their varied, synchronized and precise marching styles, inclusive of their fierce look and demeanor, include high-stepping, the rigid strut and the glide or military style. Their utter presence embraces and exudes pride, which is coupled with their robust and magnificent sound. They have been consistently critically acclaimed and have drawn rave reviews nationwide in all media.

Discipline and "Spartan-like" behavior is the key to the innumerable honors that the Spartan "Legion" has won. Selected performances include, most recently, the Barack Obama Presidential campaign rally in Norfolk, VA. The "Legion's" history includes the Philadelphia Parade commemorating the



The game was marred with delays due to lightning in the area. At approximately 1:18 a.m. on Sunday morning roughly five and a half hours later, the contest was inevitably called over with 2:12 remaining in the fourth after a fourth lightning strike was observed in the downtown Atlanta area. MFAC/SWAC MVP Dematrius Davis, led the Hornets attack with 224 yards of total offense (187 passing 1 TD, 1 INT, 37 rushing). The Hornets engineered a MEAC/SWAC Challenge record setting 99-vard drive. highlighted by a 61-yard pitch and catch from backup quarterback Myles Crawley to Isaiah Scott. Jackson State dominated South Carolina State from start to finish, scoring the game's first 37 points and earning their first Cricket MEAC/SWAC Challenge win in three tries. The game was played in front of a vibrant crowd of 24,238, marking the largest Cricket MEAC/SWAC Challenge attendance since the event moved to Atlanta. Tigers' quarterback Jason Brown, playing his first game for Jackson State, set Cricket MEAC/SWAC Challenge records for passing yards (364) and completion percentage (87) on his way to MVP honors. The game also marked the debut for Jackson State coach T.C. Taylor, a former receiver and defensive back for the Tigers. Irv

Mulligan led the Tigers' ground attack with 109 yards rushing and a touchdown. Defensively, JSU was stellar. They held SC State to only 64 yards passing on eight completions, and nearly pitched the MSC's first shutout. Leading 34-0 in the waning minutes of the game, SCSU quarterback Corey Fields Jr. returned to the field from an earlier benching to lead the Bulldogs on a 10-play, 75-yard scoring drive. Fields hit receiver Keshawn Toney for an 18-yard touchdown pass with 22-seconds left to play. Fields finished the game 7-of-20, for 60 yards, a touchdown and one interception. Toney had three receptions for 41 yards and the team's only touchdown.
