

TIFFANY GREENE | GAME HOST

Tiffany Greene is a play-by-play commentator for ESPN, covering a variety of collegiate sports including basketball, football, softball and volleyball. She is the first African-American woman to serve as a play-by-play commentator for college football on FSPN.

Greene has called a number of postseason games including the NCAA Women's Division I Basketball Tournament, NCAA

Softball Regional and Super Regionals, as well as NCAA Volleyball Regionals.

Greene originally began working with ESPN as a college football sideline reporter in 2012. She has since worked on the Women's College World Series, Air Force Reserve Bowl on ABC and multiple bowl games

Prior to ESPN, Greene honed her skills as a play-by-play announcer and sports reporter at Bright House Sports Network in the Orlando and Tampa Bay markets. During that time, she was the play-by-play announcer for the

inaugural season of BIG EAST women's basketball on Fox Sports 1.

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Greene is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Links Incorporated and the National Association of Black Journalists. She began her on-air career in 2004 as a one-man band

Greene earned her Bachelor's degree in Broadcast Journalism



MARK JONES | PLAY-BY-PLAY COMMENTATOR

Mark Jones has worked a wide variety of assignments for ESPN since his debut in 1990. He is a play-by-play commentator for NBA, including the NBA Finals, WNBA, college football and men's and women's college basketball telecasts.

Jones hosted the network's SportsCenter coverage of the NBA Finals from 1991-96 and 2007-10 and called playby-play for the 2011 NBA Finals for ESPN 3D. He has also hosted ESPN's coverage of NBA All-Star events, the NBA Draft Lottery, and has contributed to the network's NBA Draft coverage. Jones previously hosted ESPN's NBA Today

and on occasion served as an anchor/ reporter on SportsCenter.

Jones has been assigned to events airing on ABC since August 1990 with duties including college football, college basketball, the World League and various events on ABC's Wide World of Sports. He called the World Track and Field Championships from Stuttgart, Germany, in 1993 and Gothenburg, Sweden, in 1995. He has also provided play-by-play commentary for the World Cup of gymnastics and the World Speed Skating Championships

Before joining ESPN and ABC Sports, Jones worked from 1986-90 for The Sports Network in Toronto, Canada, where reporter at WJCL/WTGS, and later, WTOC in Savannah, GA.

Jones has represented Canada in international basketball competition, but now enjoys his life as an American citizen, residing in Miami with his wife, Sara, and their three children.

At Howard, Walker led the team to their first playoff berth in team history and was named an All-American, to the All-MEAC Team twice and was the I-AA football player of the year by Sports Illustrated. That year, 1993, Howard earned its only undefeated season in program history.

The NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and a 2013 Pro Bowl selection, Griffin III helped Washington go from 5-11 the previous year to 10-6 after a seven-game win streak clinched the NFC East division title for the first time since 1999 and earned Washington its first playoff appearance since 2007. Griffin III also set records at the time for highest passer rating (102.4) by a rookie quarterback, highest touchdown to interception ratio (4:1) by a rookie quarterback, and injected life into the nation's capital

In 2017, Griffin III was a guest analyst on ESPN's NFL Live. He also appeared on the cover of ESPN The Magazine's 15th anniversary issue in 2013 and has presented and won at The ESPYs Awards.



QUINT KESSENICH | REPORTER

Ouint Kessenich began at ESPN in 1993 covering men's lacrosse. He currently serves as a lacrosse analyst and college sports reporter, working on football and wrestling.

Kessenich works on television's most extensive college lacrosse package - featuring regular-season action and the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship, an event he has covered since 1995. He also works as an analyst on Major League Lacrosse games on ESPN2 and ESPN3.

Under his reporting duties, Kessenich covers college football and the NCAA Division I Wrestling Championship.

Since joining the company, his responsibilities expanded to high school football men's college basketball and various NCAA championships, including track and field, and soccer. He established the ESPNU Lacrosse Podcast in 2010, and it quickly became the industry leader for lacrosse news. He was also a frequent contributor to ESPNU.com. In addition, he has covered the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes for ESPN and ABC.

Kessenich contributes to Inside Lacrosse Magazine, and is actively involved with "First Stick", a non-profit that introduces urban schools and athletes to the game of lacrosse. He was also a columnist on college lacrosse for the Baltimore Sun

Kessenich played one year of professional lacrosse with the Baltimore Thunder in 1999, and at the amateur level for the storied Mount Washington Lacrosse Club.

A four-time all-American goalkeeper, Kessenich was a twotime winner of the Ensign C. Markland Kelly, Jr., Award as the nation's best goalie. A 1990 graduate of Johns Hopkins University, Kessenich remained in Baltimore where he has been an assistant lacrosse coach at the Boys' Latin School, a nerennial national nower since 1992

He is a member of the Johns Hopkins Athletic Hall of Fame, as well as the Long Island Chapter and the Baltimore Chapter of USA Lacrosse Hall of Fame.




MID-EASTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) enters its 52nd year of intercollegiate competition with the 2021-22 academic school year. Located in Norfolk, VA, the MEAC is made up of eight outstanding historically black institutions across the Atlantic coastline: Coppin State University, Delaware State University, Howard University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Morgan State University, Norfolk State University, North Carolina Central University and South Carolina State University.

The MEAC sponsors 14 Division I (FCS) sports: women's bowling, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's track & field, softball and volleyball. The MEAC receives automatic NCAA qualification bids in seven sports – men's and women's basketball, women's bowling, men's and women's tennis, softball and volleyball. The MEAC's football champion is pitted against the champion of the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) in the Cricket Celebration Bowl, which debuted in December 2015.

In 1969, a bold ad hoc group of innovators long associated with intercollegiate athletics met in Durham, NC, to discuss the feasibility of organizing a new conference. From these discussions, they formed a steering and planning committee to fully investigate the idea, presented a detailed report with recommendations to



interested collegiate institutions and constructed a workshop to outline proposals.

The conference was confirmed in 1970, kicking off its first season of competition in football in 1971.

On June 8, 1980, the MEAC was classified as a Division I conference by the NCAA; prior to that year, the conference had operated on the Division II level. The month after achieving Div. I status, the MEAC received automatic qualification to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship. Currently, the conference has automatic qualifying bids for NCAA postseason play in men's basketball (since 1981), women's basketball (since 1982), softball (since 1995), men's and women's tennis (since 1998), volleyball (since 1994) and women's bowling (since 2018).

In 2015, the MEAC combined with the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) for the Celebration Bowl in Atlanta, GA. North Carolina A&T State defeated Alcorn State in the inaugural Celebration Bowl to determine the Black College National Champion in a game pitting the MEAC and SWAC champions. North Carolina Central represented the MEAC in the 2016 Celebration Bowl, taking on Grambling State.

North Carolina A&T State returned to the Celebration Bowl in 2017, defeating Grambling State 21-14 to complete the first undefeated season in MEAC history and claim the Aggies' second Black College National Championship in three years. In 2021, South Carolina State defeated heavily favored Jackson State 31-10 to give the Bulldogs their first Cricket Celebration Bowl title and the MEAC a 5-1 record in the bowl game.

The MEAC also has a strong presence in the National Football League (NFL), both throughout the league's history and today. For the start of the 2022 season, there were 12 former MEAC players on active NFL rosters – highlighted by South Carolina State's Darius Leonard (2018 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, two-time Pro Bowler) and Decobie Durant (2022 fourthround draft pick).



SOUTHWESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE HISTORY

In 1920, eight men representing six colleges from the state of Texas met to discuss collegiate athletics and the many challenges that faced their respective institutions. By the time the session in Houston had concluded, they had founded an athletic league that has slowly became one of the leading sports associations in the world of collegiate athletics, the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC).

The founding fathers of the original "Super Six" were C.H. Fuller of Bishop College, Red Randolph and C.H. Patterson of Paul Quinn, E.G. Evans, H.J. Evans and H.J. Starns of Prairie View A&M, D.C.

Fuller of Texas College and G. Whitte Jordan of Wiley College.

The SWAC is considered one of the premier HBCU conferences in the country and currently ranks among the elite in the nation in terms of HBCU alumni playing with professional sports teams. The league continues to set the bar for college football attendance, leading all Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) conferences for 43 of the past 44 seasons as of 2021.

The Southwestern Athletic Conference has three members based in Mississippi (Alcorn State, Jackson State, Mississippi Valley State), two in Alabama (Alabama A&M, Alabama State), two in Louisiana (Grambling State, Southern), two in Texas (Prairie View A&M, Texas Southern), one in Arkansas (Arkansas-Pine Bluff), and two in Florida (Florida A&M and Bethune-Cookman).

Current championship competition offered by the league includes competition for men in Baseball, Basketball, Cross Country, Football, Golf, Indoor Track and Field, Outdoor Track and Field and Tennis. FIRST TIME'S A CHARM WHO WILL HOLD THE TROPHY ON SATURDAY?

BISON MAKE FIRST TRIP TO CRICKET MEAC/SWAC CHALLENGE; HORNETS LOOK FOR THEIR FIRST WIN.

The best way to kickoff the college football season is with a rivalry game. There's none better among historically black colleges and universities than the Cricket MEAC/SWAC Challenge Kickoff at Center Parc Stadium in Atlanta, GA, on Saturday, August 27.

This HBCU matchup will feature Howard University, representing the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, and Alabama State. representing the Southwestern Athletic Conference. This contest is for bragging rights among the nation's two conferences that serve HBCU Division I programs.

Alabama State was predicted fourth in the Southwestern Athletic Conference according to the league's head coaches and sports information directors. Eddie Robinson, Jr., Alabama State's first-year head football coach, is looking forward to this opening season game with Howard.

"Howard University, if you know about black colleges and black college football or HBCUs in general, you have to start with Howard," Robinson said. "I think to start out with the MEAC/SWAC Challenge, it's a big goal of ours to get that game and to get a 'W' [win] not [just] for Alabama State, but for the SWAC, We're excited about kicking off the season."

Robinson will be coaching his first game at his alma mater. He was an All-SWAC selection during his career with the Hornets (1988-91). Robinson was the SWAC Defensive Player of the Year 1990 and 1991 at linebacker. Moreover, Robinson was named the 2012 MEAC/SWAC Challenge Legend. So, he knows the significance of this rivalry with the MEAC.

Hornets' safety Irshaad Davis and guard Robert Alston earned first-team preseason All-SWAC honors. Davis led Alabama State with

67 tackles (40 solo tackles). Davis is certainly a player to watch in this contest.

On the other side of the ledger, Howard was chosen to finish fifth in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference according to the conference coaches and sports information directors.

The Bison are led by preseason All-MEAC seniors, wide-receiver Antoine Murray, and defensive lineman Darrian Brokenburr. Murray had 33 receptions for 629 yards and seven touchdowns, averaging 19.1 yards a catch last season. Brokenburr led the Bison with 3.5 sacks in 2021, while compiling 23 tackles and 4.0 tackles for loss.

Running backs Jarett Hunter and Ian Wheeler provide a one-two punch for the Bison offensive backfield. Both were selected preseason All-MEAC second team. Hunter, the team's leading rusher last season, finished with 137 carries for 643 yards and three TDs. Wheeler had 65 attempts for 443 yards and eight TDs.

Howard head football coach Larry Scott is hoping to turn around a squad that finished with just three wins in 2021, in his first full season with the Bison. He would like to see the Bison get off to a great start against the Hornets.

"It's a critical game for us," Scott said. "It's the stage that you come to Howard to play in.

We have one goal, to start in Atlanta and end in Atlanta."

Of course, the final game in Atlanta is the Cricket Celebration Bowl on December 17, which features the champions from the MEAC and the SWAC and is regarded by many as the black college national championship.

The MEAC holds an 11-4 advantage over the SWAC in the MEAC/SWAC Challenge series. Alabama State played in the inaugural game in 2005 at Legion Field in Birmingham, falling to South Carolina State, 27-14. Alabama State is 1-0 all-time against Howard, defeating the Bison, 27-12 in 2004 in Detroit.

Cable served nearly three years as Senior Associate Commissioner for Administration at the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) prior to his arrival at Alabama State.

Cable has an extensive background in athletics, academics, compliance and athletic program leadership that has provided him with a unique

skillset anchored by a proven record of leadership, integrity and efficiency.

Cable began his career at his alma mater, Alcorn State, as the Assistant Men's Basketball Coach and an instructor of Health/Physical Education. During his tenure at Alcorn State, Cable served as the principal investigator for the successful receipt of the \$900,000 NCAA AASP Grant and secured over \$2,000,000 in supplemental funding to support athletic programs and support services, while developing corporate partnerships with NASCAR, Allstate, NUCOR, USTA and Wal-Mart.

Under his leadership, the number of student-athletes with a 3.0 cumulative GPA or higher increased by 70, and the department reached an all-time high overall GPA of 3.24. Cable also developed the nation's first degree program in NCAA Compliance and Academic Progress Reporting.

Cable is a native of Huntsville, Alabama. He completed his Ph.D. in Higher Education Administration at Jackson State University in the summer of 2019.

Eddle Robinson, Jr. was named the 30th head coach in Alabama State University on November 26, 2021, returning to his alma mater.

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A native of Louisiana, Robinson was born and raised in New Orleans. He attended Brother Martin High School, graduating in 1988. He furthered his education attending Alabama State University on an academic scholarship. He earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Chemistry in 1994.

He lettered in football all four years and earned All-SWAC honors and SWAC Defensive Player of the Year honors in 1990 and 1991, Sheridan Broadcasting Network All-America honors in 1990 and 1991, as well as Defensive Player of the Year honors in 1991 as a linebacker for the Hornets. Robinson also achieved academic All-Conference honors and was recognized as The Toyota Leadership Award recipient in 1990. In 1998, he became the youngest individual to be inducted into the SWAC Hall of Fame at 28 years old, and in 2012 he was recognized as a MEAC/ SWAC Challenge Legend.

Robinson was the Houston Oilers' second round pick in the 1992 NFL draft, the 50th player selected.

He was a stalwart in the community during his 11year NFL career, playing with the Houston Oilers (1992–1995), Jacksonville Jaguars (1996–1997), Tennessee Titans (1998–2001) and Buffalo Bills (2002), appearing in Super Bowl XXXIV with the Titans in 2000. He finished his career with 850, 23 sacks and six interceptions. Robinson received the Titans Unsung Hero award for the Tennessee Titans during his career. He was the ultimate professional and obtained the nickname "Steady Eddie" for his methodical preparation and on-field knowledge of the game, receiving accolades from his coaching staff and teammates for his leadership skills and attention to detail.

Robinson retired from the NFL following the 2002 season and entered the business world and is

currently the owner/manager of Magnolia River LLC Real Estate Investment Company.

He was a college football analyst for Fox Sports South, ESPNU,

ESPN3 and Comcast Sports South from 2005 until 2014. In addition, he was a co-host on a regionally televised weekly sports show, INSIDE SWAC, from 2006 to 2009 and continues to broadcast collegiate football games on the radio and appears on sports podcast as a featured guest.

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Robinson possesses more than 30 plus years of experience at various levels of Football. He is a stellar ASU Alumnus and a man of vision who has a proven record of success. He assisted ASU in establishing its Football Hall of Fame and has been a consistent supporter of ASU athletic programs financially and by supporting athletic administrations and coaches.

He has worked to support the mission of HBCUs academically and athletically.

He has hosted Youth Football camps at Alabama State University, Texas Southern University and in his Houston Third Ward community. Robinson regularly speaks to high school students and young athletes promoting life skills and planning for success. He is an NFL Ambassador for USA Football helping to promote the game of football to parents and young football players. He mentored and coached an inner-city baseball league in the Sunnyside neighborhood of Houston and incorporated a program to help young African-American baseball players achieve youth and high school success in baseball with a goal of playing baseball in college and professionally. Two of his players have signed college scholarships to play college baseball with others expected to follow this path and all have plans to attend college. He volunteers his time with the Houston school districts' Real Men Read program, reading to elementary school kids, and sharing his keys to success.

Robinson is a member of the SWAC Alumni Association and a life member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and resides in Houston (Texas). He is the father of three sons who participate in high school and college athletics.

WAYNE A.I. FREDERICK PRESIDENT

Dr. Wayne A. I. Frederick was appointed the 17th president of Howard University in 2014 and was named the distinguished Charles R. Drew Professor of Surgery by the Board of Trustees in 2020. He previously served in numerous capacities within the University, including provost and chief academic officer. Today, he continues to perform in the operating room and teach in the classroom.

As president, Dr. Frederick has advanced Howard University's commitment to student opportunity, academic innovation, public service and fiscal

stability. He has also pursued initiatives to streamline and strengthen University operations. In addition, he has overseen a series of reform efforts, including the expansion of academic offerings, establishing innovative programs to support student success and the modernization of University facilities.



Dr. Frederick matriculated to Howard in 1988 to pursue a B.S./M.D. dual degree program. He completed the requirements for both degrees in six years, allowing him to earn his Bachelor of Science degree and his medical degree by the age of 22. He also earned a Master of Business Administration from Howard University's School of Business in 2011.

ethnic and gender disparities in cancer care outcomes, especially in relation to gastrointestinal cancers. He also devotes his time to writing and speaking on salient topics in higher education and the underrepresentation of African-Americans in health care.

Kery Davis was appointed Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at Howard University by Dr. Wayne A.I. Frederick in September of 2015.

Since arriving at the Mecca, the Bison have enjoyed a renaissance under Davis' leadership, chartering a course that has established Howard as an innovative leader in the college sports landscape.

Davis oversees Howard University's 21 collegiate sports programs, the most of any HBCU. During his tenure, the athletic programs have achieved remarkable success in the classroom, winning

awards for its graduation rates and culminating with the highest department GPA in recent history.

Davis joined Howard University with an impressive track record of accomplishments. Prior to Howard, Davis served as the Senior Vice President of Programming for HBO's award-winning Sports Division. During his tenure



at HBO, Davis negotiated multi-year agreements for HBO with major league sports franchises such as the NFL and NHL.

During his tenure, the department created groundbreaking original programming such as Hard Knocks and the 24/7 series and produced critically acclaimed and award-winning documentaries such as Magic Johnson and Larry Bird: A Courtship of Rivals.


In 2019, Howard announced its plan to relaunch a men's and women's golf program with a gift

LARRY SCOTT HFAD COACH Alma Mater: University of South Florida



HOWARD COACHING STAFF

On February 6, 2020, Howard University announced Larry Scott as its football head coach. Scott joined the Bison Family with more than 15 years of collegiate experience, including six postseason bowl/playoff game victories (10 appearances overall).

CHALLENGE

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The Sebring, FL, native has spent a majority of his coaching career in the state of Florida, where he attended (1997-99) and coached (2006-12) at South Florida as well as Miami (2013-15) and most recently Florida (2018-2020). Prior to ioining the Florida coaching staff. Scott was a member of Ethan Wolf staff at the University of Tennessee (2016-17).

A 2000 graduate from the University of South Florida (USF), Scott played offensive lineman for the Bulls. After four seasons of high school coaching experience, Scott joined the USF staff in 2005 as Director of High School Relations. During his time at USF, Scott coached the offensive line, tight ends and running backs as well as serving as a lead recruiter.

In 2008, Scott helped lead the Bulls to their best recruiting class in program history, only to surpass that class with the nation's No. 21 ranked class in 2009.

During his time in Coral Gables, Scott served as the Hurricanes' tight ends coach for twoplus seasons (2013-15) prior to being named their interim head coach for the final six games of 2015. As Miami's interim coach. Scott led the Hurricanes to a 4-2 mark and a berth in the Sun Bowl.

Howard (2020-present)

After playing a pair of games during the 2021 COVID-19 spring season, Scott coached 10 Bison to the All-MEAC Team following the 2021 fall campaign.

On October 2, 2021, Scott earned his first win as Bison head coach, knocking off FCS powerhouse Sacred Heart at Greene Stadium.

In December 2021, Scott signed the highestranked recruiting class in program history.

Scott spent two seasons with Dan Mullen as the assistant coach and tight ends coach, where he guided his position group to multiple personal bests and better numbers than in years prior.

In the 2021 NFL Draft, Scott saw Kyle Pitts selected fourth overall by the Atlanta Falcons, making him the highest drafted tight end in league history.

Tennessee (2016-17)

Scott helped Ethan Wolf cap his career in 2017 as one of the greatest tight ends in Rocky Top history. Wolf ranked No. 2 among UT tight ends in career receptions (91) and No. 3 in receiving vards (998) and led the Vols with 47 starts.

Miami (2013-15)

Scott spent two-plus seasons as the Hurricanes' tight ends coach prior to being named their interim head coach for the final six games of 2015. As Miami's interim head coach. Scott led the Hurricanes to a 4-2 mark and a berth in the Sun Bowl.

In 2014, Scott oversaw a tight end unit that combined for 52 receptions and 833 yards receiving. He also mentored Clive Walford, who had a breakout 2014 campaign, where he led the team in receptions with 44. Following the year, Walford was selected in the third round of the NFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

USF (2005-12)

Prior to coming to Coral Gables, Scott spent the previous eight seasons at USF, beginning in 2005 as the director of high school relations. In 2006, he moved to a graduate assistant role, before coaching tight ends in 2007-08 and again in 2010-11. Between tight end coaching stints, he coached the offensive line in 2009. In 2012, he coached the running backs and became an offensive assistant.


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



South Carolina State University (SCSU) guarterback Cleveland McCoy took home the most valuable player as he racked up 240 vards of total offense in their 27-14 win over Alabama State in the inaugural MEAC/SWAC Challenge in front of an announced crowd of 18,452 at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. Opposing Alabama State University (ASU) guarterback Tarvaris Jackson threw for 255 yards and two touchdowns to take most valuable player honors for the Hornets, ASU never led and had significant problems moving the football for most of the afternoon. McCoy finished off a five-play, 70-yard drive with an 11-yard touchdown run to give the Bulldogs a 7-0 advantage on their first series. Their next series ended with a 28-yard field goal by Stephen Grantham and when DeShawn Baker scored from one yard out 41 seconds into the second quarter, SCSU had built a 17-0 advantage. SCSU racked up 416 yards in total offense. By halftime, the Bulldogs led 17-7. After a roughing the kicker penalty erased a 22-yard field goal by Grantham, SCSU's Jonathan Woods marched in from the 4-yard line to put the Hornets into a 24-7 hole with five seconds left in the third quarter. A 22-yard field goal by Grantham with 10 minutes to go expanded the SCSU lead to 27-7, but Jackson and Hoffman hooked up on a 79-yard touchdown pass on the Hornets' next play from scrimmage to close out the scoring.
