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OLIVIA DEKKER REPORTER

Olivia Dekker joined ESPN in 2015 as a sideline reporter for college football games. She is currently a football reporter, working with Jason Benetti and Kelly Stouffer on ESPN or ESPN2 Friday Primetime games. She previously worked games on the SEC Network with the team of Taylor Zarzour and Andre Ware.

She was previously a sideline reporter for Green Bay Packers preseason games on Packers TV Network, and a host of ACC All-Access and sideline reporter for Atlanta Hawks games on Fox Sports South.

Prior to ESPN, Dekker covered SEC and ACC football for Fox Sports South and Raycom as a reporter in 2014. In 2013, she co-hosted a daily web series on packers.com for the Green Bay Packers training camp as the team reporter.

Olivia graduated with honors from the University of Georgia in 2014 with a digital and broadcast journalism degree from the Grady College of Journalism. While in college, Dekker covered Georgia Bulldogs athletics for IMG's georgiadogs. com, where she created and hosted "Dawg Sitting," a weekly profile on a different football player, served as the football beat reporter and host of "Game Day" on Saturday mornings from Sanford Stadium.

Dekker, a native of Kansas City, Kan., was crowned Miss Kansas Teen USA in 2010, where she took her title to propel her reporting career around the Kansas City area and gave back to the community, focusing on healthy mind and body education in elementary school children.



JAY WALKER COMMENTATOR – COLLEGE FOOTBALL ANALYST

Jay Walker joined ESPN in 2005 as a college football analyst. He has called the ESPNU Thursday Night games for the last four years, in addition to a studio analyst for the last two years. He has also been an analyst on College Football Overdrive.

Walker started his television career with BET and then joined the now defunct MBC Network from 2002-05.

Out of college, Walker was drafted in the seventh round in 1994 by the New England Patriots, where he played for two seasons. He also spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings.

Walker was drafted out of high school to be a pitcher in the California Angles organization's minor league team, one of a handful of players to play both minor league baseball and in the NFL. While playing in the minors, Walker decided to pursue his passion for football and was recruited as a quarterback to Long Beach State and eventually transferred to Howard University after football was cut as a sport at Long Beach. At Howard, Walker led the team to their first playoff berth in team history and was named an All-American, to the All-MEAC Team twice and was the I-AA football player of the year by Sports Illustrated. That year, 1993, Howard earned its only undefeated season in program history.

A native of Los Angeles, Walker is a 1994 graduate from Howard with a political science degree. In 2005, he was inducted into the Howard University Athletics Hall of Fame, and most recently, he was named to the MEAC/ SWAC All-Time Greatest Team.

Currently, Walker is CEO and President of Walker Financial Services and has been a member of the House of Delegates in Maryland since 1997. He serves on the House Ways and Means Committee and its education and finance resources subcommittees. He is also a member of the Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland.



TIFFANY GREENE COMMENTATOR – PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER

Tiffany Greene is a play-by-play commentator for ESPN, covering a variety of collegiate sports including basketball, football, softball and volleyball.

Greene has called a number of postseason games including the NCAA Women's Division I Basketball Tournament, NCAA Softball Regional and Super Regionals, as well as NCAA Volleyball Regionals. She is the first African-American woman to serve as a play-by-play commentators for a nationally televised college football game on ESPN.

Greene originally began working with ESPN as a college football sideline reporter in 2012. She has since worked on the Air Force Reserve Celebration Bowl on ABC and a handful of bowl games. Greene also reported on the College Football All-Star Challenge.

Prior to ESPN, Greene honed her skills as a playby-play announcer and sports reporter at Bright House Sports Network in the Orlando and Tampa Bay markets. During that time, she was the playby-play announcer for inaugural season of BIG EAST women's basketball on Fox Sports 1.

Greene is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Links Incorporated and the National Association of Black Journalists. She began her on-air career in 2004 as a one-man band reporter at WJCL/WTGS, and later, WTOC, in Savannah, Ga.

Greene earned her Bachelor's degree in Broadcast Journalism from the Florida A&M University. She serves as the FAMU School of Journalism & Graphic Communication Board of Visitors co-chair. Greene lives in Tampa with her husband, Aaron, and their son Bryson.

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MEAC/SWAC CHALLENGE 2018 BY DONALD HUNT

UILDING ON A

The 14th annual MEAC/SWAC Challenge will feature North Carolina Central against Prairie View A&M in a great matchup of two talented football teams from rival black college conferences. The kickoff for this HBCU classic will take place on Sunday, Sept. 2 from Georgia State Stadium in Atlanta, Ga. at Noon on ESPN2.

North Carolina Central will represent the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. The Eagles have been one of the MEAC's best teams over the last four years. In 2016, NCCU dropped a 10-9 decision to Grambling State in the Celebration Bowl. NCCU is coming off a 7-4 season last year.

Eagles interim head coach Granville Eastman should have a great team this season. NCCU has nine players who earned preseason all-conference honors. NCCU senior safety Davanta Reynolds was named the preseason MEAC Defensive Player of the Year. Reynolds, a 5-foot-10, 200-pounder, had 54 total and 35 solo tackles last year. In addition, he had an impressive six interceptions.

The Eagles' junior defensive lineman Kawuan Cox should be a real force up front. Cox, a 6-foot-2, 230-pounder, can play the run and rush the passer. He has 43 total and 27 solo tackles. He had eight quarterback sacks, which led the team. He was chosen to the preseason All-MEAC first team defense. On offensive, NCCU sophomore running back Isaiah Totten was named to the preseason All-MEAC first team offense. Totten is one of the league's top rushers. A year ago, he gained 718 yards on 125 carries and scored five touchdowns. He averaged 5.7 yards a carry.

The other NCCU players to watch include Xavier McCoy (wide receiver) tight end Josh McCoy (tight end), Nick Leverett (offensive lineman), Andrew Dale (offensive lineman), Randy Anyanwu (defensive lineman) and De'Mario Evans (defensive back).

From the Southwestern Athletic Conference, Prairie View A&M has a solid football program. Panthers first-year head coach Eric Dooley will build on the team's foundation. Dooley has some terrific players, which should help to get the Prairie View A&M offense in high gear.

The offensive line will be anchored by Corbin Finlayson and Roderick Smith. Finlayson, a 6-foot-3, 295-pound redshirt junior, and Smith, a 6-foot-2, 285-pound junior, are both good run and pass blockers.


The Panthers appear to be loaded at the skilled positions with running back Dawonya Tucker, wide receiver Markcus Hardy and tight end Zarrian Holcombe. Tucker, a 5-foot7, 170-pound junior, had 89 carries for 485 yards and five touchdowns. He averaged 5.4 yards a carry. Hardy, a 6-foot-2, 215-pound senior, can really stretch the field with his speed. He caught 14 passes for 280 yards and three TDs. He tallied 20 yards a reception. Holcombe, a 6-foot-6, 235-pound junior, has great size and strength. He had 10 receptions for 94 yards and two TDs.

Defensively, the Panthers should have a good secondary with cornerbacks Ju'Anthony Parker and Reggie Stubblefield. Parker, a 5-foot-11, 165-pound junior, had 28 total and 22 solo tackles. He also had four interceptions and returned two of them for touchdowns. Stubblefield, a 6-foot, 180-pound junior, had 51 total and 28 solo tackles. He did a great job of playing the run.

Prairie View A&M finished with a 6-5 overall record last year. The Panthers look like a team to watch in the SWAC West Division. Speaking of the SWAC, Southern defeated South Carolina State to win the MEAC/SWAC Challenge last season. Now, Prairie View A&M and North Carolina Central will battle for bragging rights in HBCU football.

MID-EASTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE



The Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) enters its 45th year of intercollegiate competition heading into the 2014-15 academic school year. Located in Norfolk, Va., the MEAC is made up of 13 outstanding historically black institutions across the Atlantic coastline: Bethune-Cookman University, Coppin State University, Delaware State University, Florida A&M University, Hampton University, Howard University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Morgan State University, Norfolk State University, North Carolina A&T State University, North Carolina Central University, Savannah State University, and South Carolina State University.

The MEAC sponsors 16 Division I (FCS) sports with automatic qualifying bids for National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) postseason competition in baseball, men's and women's basketball, football, men's golf, men's and women's tennis, softball, and volleyball.

MEAC student-athletes excel on and off the field and several have been recognized on ESPN The Magazine/ CoSIDA Academic All-America and All-District teams. The conference sponsors All-Academic teams in each of its sports and awards two post-graduate scholarships of \$5,000 each annually to one male and one female student-athlete who have excelled academically and athletically and are in their final season of intercollegiate athletics eligibility and competition under MEAC and NCAA regulations.

MEMBERSHIP HISTORY

In 1969, a bold ad hoc group of innovators long associated with intercollegiate athletics met in Durham, North Carolina, to discuss the feasibility of organizing a new conference. From these discussions, they formed a steering and planning committee to fully investigate the idea, present a detailed report with recommendations to interested collegiate institutions and construct a workshop to outline proposals.

After selecting a proposal and adopting a program, seven institutions (Delaware State College, Howard University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Morgan State University, North Carolina A&T State University, North Carolina Central University and South Carolina State College) agreed to become the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. Their major objective was to establish, organize and supervise an intercollegiate athletic program among a compact group of educational institutions of high academic standards with a sound philosophy of co-curricular activities. The conference agreed to seek Division I status for its sports.

HISTORY

VILDING

The conference was confirmed in 1970, kicking off its first season of competition in football in 1971.

In 1978, the MEAC reached a milestone when it selected Kenneth A. Free to be its first full-time commissioner. Free served the conference for 18 years before stepping down in May of 1996.

In July 1996, Charles S. Harris was named commissioner and served in the capacity until April 2002. On September 1, 2002, Dr. Dennis E. Thomas was named commissioner and has served in the position for 10 years.

The conference's first expansion occurred in October 1979, when Bethune-Cookman College and Florida A&M University were voted into the MEAC as members. Original members Morgan State, North Carolina Central and Maryland Eastern Shore withdrew from the conference at the end of the 1979-80 fiscal year. Maryland Eastern Shore was readmitted in 1981 and Morgan State returned in 1984. Florida A&M opted to resign in 1984 but rejoined the conference in 1986. Coppin State College was granted admittance in 1985, becoming the ninth member institution.

The MEAC expanded again in the 1990s with the inclusion of Hampton University (1995) and Norfolk State University (1997). The conference grew once again in 2007 with the addition of Winston-Salem State University. Winston-Salem State, a MEAC provisional member, did not meet the qualifications for Division I and withdrew from the conference following the 2009-10 academic and athletic season. On July 1, 2010, the MEAC made its most recent expansion with the admittance of North Carolina Central and Savannah State University.

On June 8, 1980, the MEAC was classified as a Division I conference by the NCAA. Prior to that year, the MEAC operated as a Division II conference. The month after it achieved Division I status, the conference received an automatic qualification to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship. Currently, the conference

has automatic qualifying bids for NCAA postseason play in baseball (since 1994), men's basketball (since 1981), women's basketball (since 1982), football (since 1996), softball (since 1995), men's and women's tennis (since 1998), and volleyball (since 1994).

SPORTS HISTORY

The MEAC declares champions in eight men's sports – baseball, basketball, cross country, football, men's golf, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and tennis - and eight women's sports - cross country, basketball, bowling, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, softball, tennis and volleyball.

The MEAC initiated cross country in 1980, and North Carolina A&T earned the inaugural men's crown. The first women's cross country championship took place a year later, with Howard winning the first of its seven titles. Indoor Track and Field was also added in 1981, with South Carolina State capturing the men's title and Howard winning the women's crown.

Tennis and golf returned as MEAC-governed sports in 1981 after a five-year hiatus. South Carolina State won all seven of the conference's golf titles from 1972-1983 before the sport was discontinued after the 1983 championship.

In wrestling, Morgan State won 13 of 24 conference championships before the sport was discontinued in 1995.

Baseball, which began in 1972, was discontinued following the 1977 season. It was brought back as a MEAC-governed sport along with women's volleyball in 1983. Women's softball became a MEAC-sanctioned sport in 1992.

Bowling was officially sanctioned as a MEAC sport in 1999. The MEAC was the first conference to secure NCAA sanctioning for women's bowling by adopting the club sport prior to the 1996-97 school year.

Men's golf returned as a MEAC sponsored sport last year, 2013-14, with six teams participating in the conference championship. Bethune-Cookman was crowned the 2013 men's conference champion. The Wildcats also won the 2013 PGA Minority Collegiate Golf Championship.

In 1920, athletic officials from six Texas HBCUs — C.H. Fuller of Bishop College, Red Randolph and C.H. Patterson of Paul Quinn College, E.G. Evans, H.J. Evans and H.J. Starns of Prairie View A&M, D.C. Fuller of Texas College and G. Whitte Jordan of Wiley College — met in Houston, Texas, to discuss common interests. At this meeting, they agreed to form a new league, the SWAC.

Paul Quinn became the first of the original members to withdraw from the league when it did so in 1929. When Langston University of Oklahoma was admitted into the conference two years later, it began the migration of state-supported institutions into the SWAC. Southern University entered the ranks in 1934, followed by Arkansas AM&N (now the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff) in 1936 and Texas Southern University in 1954.

Rapid growth in enrollment of the state-supported schools made it difficult for the church-supported schools to finance their athletics programs and one by one they fell victim to the growing prowess of the


state-supported colleges. Bishop withdrew from the conference in 1956, Langston in 1957 and Huston-Tillotson (formerly Samuel Huston) in 1959, one year after the admittance of two more state-supported schools: Grambling College and Jackson State College.

The enter-exit cycle continued in 1961 when Texas College withdrew, followed by the admittance of Alcorn A&M (now Alcorn State University) in 1962. Wiley left in 1968, the same year Mississippi Valley State College entered. Arkansas AM&N exited in 1970 and Alabama State University entered in 1982.

Arkansas–Pine Bluff (formerly Arkansas AM&N) rejoined the SWAC on July 1, 1997, regaining full-member status one year later. Alabama A&M University became the conference's tenth member when it became a full member in September, 1999 after a one year period as an affiliate SWAC member. Most of the former SWAC members that have left the conference are currently a part of the Red River Athletic Conference of the NAIA. Today, the SWAC, considered the premier HBCU conference, ranks among the elite in the nation in terms of alumni playing with professional sports teams, particularly in the sport of football. On the gridiron, the conference as been the biggest draw on the Football Championship Subdivision level of the NCAA, leading the nation in average home attendance for 19 of the 20 years the FCS has been in existence.

In 1994, the SWAC fell just 40,000 fans short of becoming the first non-Football Bowl Subdivision conference to attract one million fans to its home games.

Current championship competition offered by the SWAC includes competition for men in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track, outdoor track & field and tennis. Women's competition is offered in the sports of basketball, bowling, cross country, golf, indoor track, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, tennis and volleyball.

FRED WASHINGTON INTERIM ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Dr. Ruth Simmons, an accomplished university president with administrative experience in Ivy League schools, a women's university and a historically black college, has been named President of Prairie View A&M University. Ruth J. Simmons was President of Brown University from 2001-2012. Under her leadership, Brown made significant strides in improving its standing as one of the world's finest research universities.

A French professor before entering university administration, President Simmons held an appointment as a Professor of Africana Studies at Brown. After completing her Ph.D. in Romance Languages and literatures at Harvard, she served in various faculty and administrative roles at the University of Southern California, Princeton University, and Spelman College before becoming president of Smith College, the largest women's college in the United States. At Smith, she launched a number of important academic initiatives, including an engineering program, the first at an American women's college.

Simmons is the recipient of many honors, including a Fulbright Fellowship to France, the 2001 President's Award from the United Negro College Fund, the 2002 Fulbright Lifetime Achievement Medal, the 2004 Eleanor Roosevelt Val-Kill Medal, the Foreign Policy Association Medal, the Ellis Island Medal of Honor, and the Centennial Medal from Harvard University. Simmons is a member of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, and the Council on Foreign Relations, and serves on the boards of Texas Instruments, Chrysler, Mondelez and Square, as well as a number of non-profit boards. Awarded numerous honorary degrees, she received the Brown Faculty's highest honor: the Susan Colver Rosenberger Medal in 2011. In 2012, she was named a 'chevalier' of the French Legion of Honor.

Fred E. Washington is in his twenty seventh year of service to Prairie View A&M University and the State of Texas. He is also retired as a Major (p) in the United States Army Reserve and served twenty-three years in that regard. Washington was appointed to his current position by The Texas A&M University System Board of Regents effective July 1, 2005.

Washington has responsibility for planning, implementation, management, and operations of the following functional units:

Washington is in his second stint directing PVAMU Athletics. Washington served in two positions as Vice President for Administration and Auxiliary Services and Athletic Director from 2008 to 2013. Washington's previous tenure as Athletic Director was at the beginning of a storied period in the annals of Panther Athletics. His five-year tenure was highlighted by PVAMU football returning to its tradition of winning as the program won the 2009 SWAC Championship, the first title in football since 1964. That championship season was the highlight of a current run in which PVAMU football is second in wins in the SWAC since 2007.

Women's basketball was the dominant program during that time, winning SWAC regular season and tournament crowns in 2008 and 2009, and, in 2011, began a streak of four consecutive SWAC Tournament Championships, earning NCAA Tournament appearances after each tourney win.

Women's Bowling won back-to-back SWAC championships in 2012 and 2013, and PVAMU baseball won the SWAC championship in 2012. The men's tennis program won a pair of SWAC titles during that time as well (2010, 2013).

In 2009-10, the athletic program earned the Barbara Jacket/Sadie Magee Award as the top overall women's sports program in the Southwestern Athletic Conference for only the second time in school history.

PVAMU Athletics then went on to win back-to-back Commissioner's Cup crowns as the top overall sports program in the SWAC in 2011-12 and 2012-13. All totaled, the Panthers won 13 SWAC regular season or tournament titles during Washington's tenure as Athletic Director.

As a commissioned officer, Washington served in several leadership positions throughout his twenty-three year career. He retired with honors after his seventh (7) year as the senior logistic trainer for the 75th Division and five (5) years and a logistics planner for the 373 Combat Service Support Battalion of Beaumont Texas. Prior to this assignments include (2) years as a supply and services officer four (4) years as a unit commander, (2) years as an executive officer (XO) responsible for all unit administrative operations and three (3) years as a platoon leader. Mr. Washington graduated from the Army Logistics Management College (ALMAC) and has three certifications in logistics management.

Washington is a three-time graduate of Prairie View A&M, receiving his Bachelor of Business Administration in Accounting (1992), Master of Business Administration in Management (1996), and Master of Arts in Community Development (2016).

Washington and his wife Alvina have four children, Andrew, Elysia, Matthew and Maegan. They reside in the northwest Houston.

ERIC DOOLEY HEAD COACH

Eric Dooley was named Prairie View A&M head football coach on Dec. 22, 2017.

Dooley, the 33rd head coach in program history, joins Panther Football after spending the previous four seasons at Grambling State University as offensive coordinator (2014-17), including one year as quarterbacks coach (2014) and two years as receivers coach (2016-17). Dooley helped the Tigers to three consecutive Southwestern Athletic Conference Western Division titles (2015-17), two SWAC Championships (2015-16), and an HBCU National Championship (2016). While at GSU, his offenses averaged at least 31 points per game in all four seasons, and ranked first or second in the SWAC in scoring offense each of the last three seasons. In 2016, he was named American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Assistant Coach of the Year.

Under Dooley's guidance in 2015, Grambling ranked fourth in the nation in scoring (41.3 points per game), scored 65 touchdowns, and averaged 470.0 yards per game. The Tigers have produced the SWAC Offensive Player of the Year each of the last three seasons (OB Johnathan Williams 2015, OB Devante Kincade 2016-17). A pair of players during Dooley's tenure are currently in the NFL (2016 free agent WR Chester Rogers - Indianapolis Colts, 2017 third-round draft pick Chad Williams - Arizona Cardinals).

In three seasons as offensive coordinator and guarterbacks coach at Arkansas-Pine Bluff (2011-13), the Golden Lions offense improved each year under his direction. In 2011, QB Ben Anderson earned SWAC Freshman of the Year accolades while ranking second in the league in passing offense. In 2012, UAPB set a school record for wins (10), and won its first outright SWAC Championship since 1966 and were crowned HBCU National Champions. During Dooley's tenure, tackle Terron Armstead became a third-round pick by the New Orleans Saints in the 2013 NFL Draft.

Those seven seasons as offensive coordinator were preceded by 14 years as an assistant coach in various roles at Southern University (1997-2010). In his one season as running backs coach (1997), he helped to produce a pair of All-SWAC rushers, including SWAC Player of the Year, Steve Wofford. As receivers coach at Southern (1997-2010), he developed the two most prolific receivers in school history (Michael Hayes, Juamorris Stewart).

Dooley played wide receiver at Grambling under legendary coach Eddie Robinson (1985 – 1988), winning two SWAC Championships. He earned his Bachelor's degree from Southern University New Orleans (1999), and his Master's degree from Southern University Baton Rouge (2005).

His professional playing experience includes earning a free agent contract with the Canadian Football League's Calgary Stampeders, one year with the AFL's Arizona Rattlers and one year with the World League's Taipei Dragons (China). He also spent time coaching at his alma mater, Alcee Fortier Senior High, as the wide receiver coach, and as offensive coordinator at McMain High School, both in New Orleans, La.

Some of his off-field activities include being a member of the American Football Coaches Association as well as being a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated.

"Eric Dooley is ready for this next step and challenge in his coaching career and we are excited to name him as our new head football coach," said PVAMU Vice President/Director of Athletics Ashley Robinson. "From receivers coach to offensive coordinator, he has been a part of or led explosive units throughout his career - resulting in a lot of championship success. He's worked under and with some of the legends of and greats of our conference - from Pete Richardson to Monte Coleman to Broderick Fobbs - all men who have led programs to championships. Our new coach has been a part of teams that have won nine SWAC Championships, six HBCU National Championships, and three Bowl game victories. Simply put, he's a winner, and we look forward to him leading Prairie View A&M football to championship success."

Dooley and his wife, Alicia, enjoy the gift of three children, Taajah, Katerra, and Dy'mond.

NORTH CAROLINA CENTRAL UNIVERSITY

Johnson O. Akinleye, Ph.D., was elected as the 12th Chancellor of North Carolina Central University (NCCU) on June 26, 2017. He was appointed Interim Chancellor in January 2017 after serving in the role of Acting Chancellor since August 2016. In these positions, Dr. Akinleye worked to expand the university's academic partnerships, including new agreements with community colleges, as well as introduced to the campus a robust online, distance-education program, NCCU Online. He also created K-12 initiatives and implemented a security strategy to increase safety for campus constituents.

Dr. Akinleye arrived at NCCU in February 2013 to serve as Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. In that role, he established the Office of Faculty Professional Development and the Office of eLearning, successfully increased fulltime student enrollment and expanded the university's degree offerings. He led the development of NCCU's 2016-2021 Academic Strategic Plan aimed at raising the university's national and international academic profile.

Prior to his arrival at NCCU, Dr. Akinleye served as Associate Vice Chancellor for Academic Programs and Associate Vice Chancellor for External Programs

Ingrid Wicker McCree, Ed.D. was appointed as the Director of Athletics at North Carolina Central University on April 23, 2008, after holding the interim position for five months.

She officially began her new leadership role on May 1, 2008.

McCree, who joined the rank of only a handful of women athletics directors in the UNC system, previously served as NCCU's associate athletics director for internal affairs. Prior to her appointment as Director of Athletics, she served in a variety of leadership positions in both conference and national level organizations, most notably as president of the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) Executive Board from 2004-06, becoming only the second woman to ever hold that position in the league's history. In addition, she served as a member of the NCAA's Division II Legislation Committee from 2003-07.

In recognition of her work, McCree received the CIAA Leadership Award for Service as president of the Executive Board and was named the CIAA Senior Woman Administrator of the Year in the spring of 2006.

McCree was one of the driving forces behind NCCU's reclassification to NCAA Division I. From 1998 until her appointment as Director of Athletics in 2008, she oversaw the internal operations of the Athletics Department, including all compliance and eligibility programs.

Under her leadership, McCree has overseen more than \$2 million in facility upgrades and renovations, including the installation of two new video scoreboards, locker room renovations, replacement of the original court in historic McDougald-McLendon at the University of North Carolina Wilmington (UNCW). While at UNCW, he expanded distance education and online programs through a public-private partnership with the company Academic Partnerships. Consequently, UNCW was the first public university in North Carolina to launch such an innovative online venture.

As Interim Dean, he consolidated one school and two departments—the School of Nursing and the Departments of Health and Applied Human Sciences and Social Work—to create the newly formed College of Health and Human Services at UNCW.

Dr. Akinleye has attended several trainings and conferences focused on federal and legislative regulations and accreditation, including the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' (SACS) Committee Chairs Breakfast Roundtable. He also has served as chairman of On-Site Reaffirmation Committees for SACS. Additionally, he has participated in White House Initiatives on Historically Black Colleges and Universities. Dr. Akinleye has chaired a committee to create academic early-warning systems and mentoring programs for struggling college students.

McCree began her career at NCCU as the head coach for women's volleyball and softball. She became the first coach in NCCU history to win conference championships in multiple sports, capturing the school's first-ever CIAA titles in softball (1998) and volleyball (1999, 2004, 2005). A three-time CIAA Volleyball Coach of the Year (1999, 2002, 2005) and former member of the NCAA Division II National Volleyball Coach of the Year (1999, 2002, 2005) and former member of the NCAA Division II National Volleyball Committee, McCree earned 239 match victories in 12 seasons as head volleyball coach at NCCU. She was also inducted into the NCCU Athletic Hall of Fame in 2004 as head coach of the 1998 softball team. McCree was selected for induction into the CIAA John B. McLendon Hall of Fame in February 2016.

A native of Durham and graduate of C.E. Jordan High School, McCree played on two North Carolina high school state volleyball championship teams, while also lettering in basketball and track and field. She continued her volleyball playing career as a student-athlete at George Washington University, lettering four seasons (1985-88) on the GWU volleyball team. She was a three-year starter and a team captain as a senior. In February 2012, she was inducted into the GWU Athletic Hall of Fame.

McCree earned her undergraduate degree in criminal justice from George Washington University in 1989, and a master's degree in recreation resources administration from North Carolina State University in December 1991. She also completed doctoral studies in higher education administration at North Carolina State University in June 2008. He holds a bachelor's degree in telecommunications and a master's degree in media technology from Alabama A&M University, as well as a doctorate in human communications studies from Howard University. He has attended numerous leadership training programs, such as the Fellow in the Millennium Leadership Initiative (MLI) Institute sponsored by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, Harvard Graduate School of Education for Leadership, Management, and Administration of Higher Education, and the Rust Administrative Academy for Faculty Administration and Management of Higher Education.

Outside of his academic career, Dr. Akinleye is well known as a motivational speaker, consultant, writer, editor and documentarian who has produced works for independent and government agencies, including the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). He is also active in civic, cultural and church-related organizations and business advisory groups. He serves on the boards of Made in Durham and Step Up Durham.

He is married to Juanita Akinleye, a registered nurse, and they have two adult children, Nikki and Peter.

On April 20, 2010, McCree was presented with the Outstanding Alumnus Award from North Carolina State University's Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism Management.

In July 2014, the Women Leaders in College Sports announced McCree as the recipient of its 2014 NCAA Division I FCS Administrator of the Year Award.

In the fall of 2015, she was appointed to the board of advisors for the Center for Research in Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The CRIA facilitates data-driven decision making and practices in intercollegiate athletics.

In 2017, McCree was named to the NCAA Division I Council, a high-level group responsible for the day-to-day decision-making for Division I.

McCree began her coaching career as a graduate assistant coach for the women's volleyball program at N.C. State (1989-90). She then spent two seasons (1992-93) as head volleyball coach and student-athlete academic counselor at North Carolina A&T State University before returning to her hometown to begin her NCCU tenure in August 1994.

McCree has been involved as a player and coach in the USA Volleyball Carolina Region. She also served as director of three USAV Junior Olympic Teams (ages 18, 16, 14 and under) and director of the Y.M.C.A. Middle School Girls' Volleyball Camp (ages 10-14).

McCree and her husband, Geno McCree, a threesport collegiate student-athlete and 1991 graduate of Elon University, are the proud parents of Alexia, Quinton and Sydney.

Granville Eastman, Interim Head Coach Fifth Season at NCCU: **First Year as Head Coach** Saint Mary's, 1992

With 20 years of collegiate coaching experience to his credit, Granville Eastman joined the North Carolina Central University football coaching staff in January 2014. He served as assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and safeties coach until his promotion to interim head coach on Dec. 8, 2017.

Prior to joining NCCU, Eastman spent nine seasons (2005-13) as the defensive coordinator at Austin Peay State University in Clarkesville, Tennessee. During his 11 total seasons at APSU, he coached defensive backs and linebackers, and also served as special teams coordinator (2003-04) and interim head coach (winter 2013).

Eastman coached four seasons (1999-2002) at Tiffin University in Ohio, including the last three seasons as defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator, while working with defensive backs and defensive line during his tenure.

A native of Toronto, Canada, Eastman secured his first coaching position at York University in

his hometown, where he spent two seasons (1994-95) working with defensive backs.

He then served as a defensive graduate assistant for three seasons (1996-98) at Arkansas State University, earning a master's degree in sociology in 1999.

He has interned with five NFL teams since 2002, lending his services to the Detroit Lions (2002), Arizona Cardinals (2004), Tennessee Titans (2006), Indianapolis Colts (2011) and Minnesota Vikings (2012).

Eastman was a two-time all-city defensive back at Stephen Leacock High School in Toronto before attending Saint Mary's University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada, where he was a three-year letterman as a defensive back. Twice Saint Mary's played in national title games while he was there. Eastman earned his bachelor's degree from Saint Mary's University in 1992.

Eastman also volunteers as a coach and mentor with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

He is married to the former Lynnette Armstrong. They are the proud parents of two sons - I.R. and Brandon.

OVERVIEW

The Sound Machine is the official marching band of North Carolina Central University (NCCU), a master's level comprehensive institution located in Durham, N.C. that offers undergraduate, graduate and professional degrees in the arts, sciences, business, law and education programs. The band has been led by Mr. Thurman D. Hollins since 2014.

The history of the NCCU's marching band dates back to 1938 when Dr. Stephen Junius Wright, an assistant professor of education at then North

Carolina College in Durham, was asked to organize the first marching band with 25 musicians.
